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From the Chair: Joanne Lawrence

I am now approaching the end of my third year as Chair of RSCDS London. In those years it has been wonderful to see confidence return to Scottish country dance groups across London as we moved from a tentative post-covid return to enjoying ever increasing numbers on the dance floor. This season, we welcomed many new dancers to the Autumn Wednesday dance, and they added greatly to the vibrant atmosphere, several returning to the Christmas dance where the energy levels reached heights only exceeded by the annual Burns Ceilidh and Supper which attracted 199 dancers.

We are fortunate in London to have a number of mutually supportive Scottish country dance groups, which create a welcoming space for dancers on most nights of the week. Once a year, several of the groups, all regular users of St Columba's, get together to create a joint evening of good dance, great music, and the best company. As this *Reel* goes out to readers, RSCDS London Branch is looking forward to joining friends from St Columba's Dancers, the London Highland Club, the Little Ship Club, the Gay Gordons, and Summer Tuesdays at the annual Combined Societies Dance on Saturday 2 March.

Later in the season we have the Summer Wednesday dance (29 May) and the End of Season dance (8 June) to look forward to. As mentioned in earlier issues of the Reel, our New Season dance has resisted the trend to higher dance numbers, and we have given considerable thought to how best to meet dancers' needs at this early stage of the season. Our plan for September 2024 is to try both a new venue and a new time. The 2024 New Season dance will therefore be an afternoon tea dance on Saturday 21 September at Maria Fidelis School, near Euston Station, where many of our classes take place (more details p4).

The move to Maria Fidelis has worked very well so far. We have been looked after wonderfully by the school and the proximity to multiple public transport routes has made it easier for many people to attend - teachers and musicians as well as dancers. Our new Fast Paced Social Dance and Technique classes have attracted good numbers and we have been delighted to see many members of our Autumn Beginners' course stepping up to the Improvers' course which started in January. Meanwhile the Richmond class continues to flourish at the Library Annexe and the Mixed Ability class at St Columba's remains a supportive and fun destination on a Wednesday afternoon. Towards the end of the season, we look forward welcoming three guest teachers, Elaine Lloyd, Jan Collings and Rose Kreloff to take our summer general classes on 5, 12, 19 June. Rose has also kindly agreed to take the first sessions of a new monthly children's class at St Columba's.

Following the Maris Fidelis theme, I am delighted to say that this is now confirmed as the venue for our 2024 Day School and musicians' workshop on Saturday 19 October. Martainn Skene will lead the workshop and teachers include Deb Lees and Graham Donald, supported by Barbara Manning, Heather Jeffrey and Ken Martlew as class musicians.

The season is moving on rapidly and it will soon be time for our Annual General Meeting (8 June). Before that, please read the information about nomination to the RSCDS London committee below, and consider if you could make time to support the Branch through a committee role. The Annual General Meeting of the London Branch of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society will be held on Saturday 8 June 2024 at 6.45pm in the Upper Hall at St Columba's Church Hall, Pont Street, London SW1X OBD. It will be followed by our End of Season Dance which will also take place in the Upper Hall. Members and friends of the Branch are invited to attend both events but only members may vote at the AGM. If you cannot get to the meeting, we will still be pleased to see you at the dance.

The meeting usually lasts about 45 minutes. You will learn about the work of the Branch and our plans for the future. The Committee welcomes your comments and opinions, either through a formal motion, which must be received in writing by the Branch Secretary by 31 March 2024, or during general discussion at the meeting. The motion should be signed by the proposer and seconder, both of whom must be members of the Branch. Only motions submitted in advance and appearing on the agenda can be voted upon. An agenda for the meeting and a report covering the Branch's activities will be circulated with the next issue of *The Reel*.

Members are also encouraged to stand for election as an office holder or Committee member. Nominees should provide the Secretary with a written nomination by 31 March 2024 signed by the nominee, a proposer and a seconder, all of whom must be Branch members. There are twelve positions in total on the Committee (Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer and Secretary) and eight ordinary members. We hope that members will step forward and join the Committee to contribute to its work and support Scottish country dancing, so please consider nominating yourself. If there are more candidates than places, ballot papers will be issued to all Branch members with the next issue of *The Reel*. It is also possible to help with various aspects of the running of the Branch without necessarily being on the Committee.

Some of you may have already caught me appearing as your musician for recent London Branch classes or you may have met me on the dance floor! I am Heather, a fairly fresh violinist to the Scottish dancing scene, but a prolific dancer in the years before that!

I started playing for the London Branch classes, both Beginners' and General, in October 2023, and will now be regularly playing for the technique class once a month. And, as the new regular violinist in Ian Robertson's

band, I have been lucky to have the opportunity to travel and play for different groups, including my first visit to the Lucy Clark Scottish Country Dancing Club in Wendover for their Christmas Dance and I am looking forward to being back at Summer Tuesdays when the warmer weather arrives. It has been great to meet more of the Scottish dancing community!

Originally, I started off as a classical violinist, with a performance diploma (DipABRSM), while also dabbling every now and again in the piano, viola and cello. The newest addition to my musical instrument collection is an accordion though it is going to take a bit of practice to be able to play reels fast enough on it! There are so many good tunes out there, with *City of Belfast* being one of my favourites and you cannot go wrong with *Deil Amang the Tailors*! I love the contrast of the jigs, reels and strathspeys. Playing for Scottish dancing is still relatively new to me, so I have got a whole expanse of more repertoire to explore and it has been really fun choosing tunes to go well together into sets, though it can be a daunting task to start due to how many tunes you can choose from!

I am a dancer myself and really enjoy being able to partake in both sides. That is where it all started - attending Summer School in St Andrews as a dancer. Meeting other musicians and hearing so much high quality live Scottish dancing music really inspired me to get involved. Now I am happy I can balance my time on and off stage.

RSCDS Dancing Achievement Awards

Following on from the successful course run last year, RSCDS London Branch is planning to run the RSCDS Dancing Achievement Awards (DAA) course again in the near future. There are three levels to the award - Intermediate, Advanced and Very Advanced.

The last course was for the Intermediate level, but depending on numbers, we would run either the Intermediate or Advanced level this time. The location and time will depend on those attending and the cost of the course will be in the region of £80, plus the exam entrance fee of £20 for members over 25 (£25 for nonmembers) and for the under 25s, £16 and £20 respectively.


I am looking forward to working with RSCDS London Branch with great anticipation. I spent an evening observing classes at the end of last year and was very impressed. Music has always played a big part in my life, and I have been playing violin since the age of seven. I am a Buckie quine, and my first big musical memory was watching my mother in a dress rehearsal for *The Merry Widow* where she played the lead in a local opera society production. I was blown away by the orchestra (and my mum!) and

by the violin section in particular. I had lessons with local teacher Steve Merson and played in school and county orchestras, quartets, music festivals and chamber orchestras throughout my school life. I went on to study with Bryan Dargie in Aberdeen and Peter Mountain in Glasgow while doing my BMus degree at Aberdeen University.

When BBC came recruiting in Aberdeen, I bagged myself a secretarial job in London and boarded a train to what turned out to be a twenty year stretch at the Corporation. I got myself into the Music and Arts department and found myself working on classical music performance, Proms, Arena, Bookmark, Rhythms of the World with forays into children's programmes, Whistle Test, Rock Gospel Show. After leaving BBC as a Unit Manager, I have since worked freelance as a documentary Line Producer.

There have been some special films along the way - Nigel Kennedy, Luciano Pavarotti, Opera Divas, La Traviata, West Side Story, Shostakovich: Siege of Leningrad. More recently, with film maker Chris Terrill, I've taken on some military subjects - Royal Marines Mission Afghanistan and The Warship - a series about HMS Queen Elizabeth. But making music has remained a constant in my life - from west London orchestras when I first arrived in London, to plugging in and going electric to play with a local Americana band, to playing with singer-songwriters in genres from rock to folk. I have also kept up with my Scottish roots and performed at Speyfest a few years ago with my old Buckie fiddler friends Dougie Lawrence and the late James Alexander. Playing continues to give me great joy and playing with others and for others makes it all the more joyful and worthwhile.

When my old school friend Willie Lawrence contacted me to ask if I was interested in playing for some classes I did not hesitate. I met up with him and his wife Kensington Joanne in Gardens at an open-air dancing event and stunned by the turnout and the enthusiasm. It was great to see so many smiling, faces dancing happy beautifully and having a great time. I hope I can keep up with the pace!

Some will know that *Hello-Goodbye*, published in RSCDS Book 51, was devised by Chris Ronald to allow the introduction of the title move without having to spend time on other tricky formations, an approach he and his wife Sue found valuable when teaching in New York. Chris, whose other dances include *Slytherin House* and *MacDonald of Keppoch*, devised a whole range of such dances for different formations, to support their teaching. Working with Amanda Peart of the Sunday Class in the East Midlands, where they are now living, Chris and Sue have now brought 32 of them together in this collection.

Alongside the dances, the book contains summaries of the main teaching points, common problems and possible skills exercises for each of the formations, making it a very valuable resource, as



Chris puts it, "to complement the descriptions in the RSCDS Manual". Some of the dances may also provide useful additions to dance programmes for variety. This CD is the first of a planned pair by Jim Lindsay and his band to complement the book. Given the book's purpose, it has a wide range of dance lengths and options for teachers, including medleys that allow a dance to be danced in strathspey and then quick time.

Another theme of the book is Chris's choice of dance titles that allude to nursery rhymes, hinting at the elementary nature of the dances - though he admits some are a bit obscure! While these are not 'originals', the concept presented Jim Lindsay with a wide-open opportunity to exhibit his creative arranging skills to bring in relevant tunes, and "he threw himself enthusiastically in the project". For example, *Hello-Goodbye* is presented here as a reel, and Jim leads off with 'So Long, Farewell' from *The Sound of Music*, together with a chance to spot a whole range of other tunes from musicals.

Other stand-out tracks include *The King of Spain's Daughter* (written to introduce the Espagnole, of course), featuring castanets and fanfares for a Spanish feel in a tune Jim has written called *Juana La Loca*. Elsewhere we can hear recorder and clarinet, bells (*Ding Dong Bell* - the Tourbillon) and the sound of a glockenspiel in Little Star (for the strathspey poussette) - the list goes on. These are all beautifully integrated into varied sets of traditional and modern tunes, so it is great fun to listen to.

None of which would work if it were not for the consistently high quality playing of Jim and the Band: David Hume (second box), Mary Rutherford and Gillian Ramsay (violins), Graham Berry (piano/bass) and Malcolm Ross (drums). There are some 'straight' tracks, and I particularly enjoyed the set for *Felicity's Frolic* (Half Diagonal Rights and Lefts), including Jay Ungar's *The Wizard's Walk*, a tune guaranteed to give life to the dancing, *Jack Be Nimble* (The Spurtle), led off with Angus Fitchet's jig *Nimble Fingers*, and final 3x32R track, for *The Wild Wood* (to introduce the lesser spotted Weasel or One-way Reels), finishing with Andrew Gifford's *The Calgary Fiddlers' Welcome to Shetland*.

As with all his recordings, Jim makes the most of the varied sounds and skills available with this band, which makes it a great CD to get you dancing, listening, tune-spotting, to support the teaching of these dances, or just to add variety to an evening's dancing. Alongside the book, it is a winning combination.

Congratulations to Ken for receiving an RSCDS Scroll at the November 2023 AGM.

Ken started Scottish country dancing in 1978 and has been an enthusiastic force for the RSCDS aims and standards in Hertfordshire and beyond. Since he was awarded his full teaching certificate in 1994, he has taught numerous day schools both for RSCDS Branches and for other clubs. Ken is a highly accomplished musician and has played for classes, day schools and dances the world over. Ken supported the formation of RSCDS Herts and Borders in March 2020 and agreed to become the first President.



Ken travelled overseas to teach Branch day schools and workshops for RSCDS Central Germany, RSCDS Lyon and RSCDS Pretoria. Ken tutored a Teachers' Certificate course in 2010 and also the former Dancing Proficiency Award.

Ken played for the RSCDS Summer School for 20 years and plays regularly for day schools recently at BHS Border Branch, RSCDS Oxfordshire, RSCDS Herts and Borders and RSCDS London. He was the pianist for over fifteen teachers' certificate courses at Summer School, RSCDS BHS Borders and RSCDS Cambridge. His compositions appear in RSCDS Pretoria's anniversary publication *Many Happy Hours* (2007).

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Music Matters 2

Continuing the Legacy - from Bobby Crowe to Jim Lindsay: Jeremy Hill

The two CDs I reviewed in *The Reel* 326 touched on a whole host of musical references, connecting Muriel Johnstone and Jim Lindsay back to Bobby Crowe, the multiple bands he led over the years, and the Olympians, with their distinctive sound based around Bobby on accordion and Dougie Maxwell on trumpet. Muriel and Jim featured on some of the dozen recordings Bobby made for the Society, which have stood the test of time, with ideal dancing tempi, perfectly selected matching tunes (largely traditional and out of copyright), and the wonderful consistency of his and the band's playing, recognised with a Society Scroll in 1997. His was in practice the dance band sound of the Society for many years.

Bobby was a huge influence on Jim Lindsay's playing, and I had the pleasure of catching up with Jim at the time of his 70th birthday in January to hear about his time playing with Bobby, and to bring the story up to date.

By the time Jim won the Jimmy Shand Shield as Scottish Accordion Champion in 1974, Bobby had already asked him to join his band. Jim covered both accordion and piano over the years, and his new ideas, expanding on the harmonic template laid down by Bobby, are much in evidence on those early Society recordings. By the time Bobby created what he considered his 'A Team', that of the early 1990s, Jim was on piano, with Ron Kerr (fiddle), Edward Galley (second accordion), Malcolm Ross (drums) and Dave Barclay (bass), creating a beautifully rounded and full sound, captured on some commercial recordings of the period, including *The Shores of Loch Alvie*.

I had the pleasure of dancing to this band all round the country, including at least once in the BHS Border Branch. I remember well the after-party, at which this new CD was being played. It is great to listen to, but we made sure to get up for the dances on the recording, including the *Eightsome Reel*, with band members joining in. When Edward Galley took a tumble, there was much amusement as the dancing continued around him! All that, before the band got back in the van, for the long drive back up to Scotland.

Bobby's sound was also much in evidence at RSCDS Summer School. For thirty years, the Olympians was the 'house band' of the St Andrews Tourist Office summer dances, with Bobby leading alongside Dougie Maxwell. When Dougie Maxwell died at the end of the 1980s, it was natural that Bobby's band would take its place (largely the same players, without the trumpet).

Around this time, Jim got together some of the same players just to have fun with Scottish and other music, which turned into a performance band, putting on concerts, broadcasting on the radio and playing at accordion and fiddle clubs. Their first recording in 1995 was appropriately entitled *Free Hand*, and features a wide range of enjoyable tracks, such as *Rondo Alla Turca* alongside medleys and a free adaptation of *The Baron's Piper*.

Sadly, Bobby suffered a stroke that caused him to retire early in 1994. Ron Kerr and Jim Lindsay took over the band's engagements, with Bobby often still providing a lot of the musical arrangements, and support from the back of the stage. He still carried an accordion case, but nowadays it contained a bar rather than instrument. They remained very busy, with the Scottish

dance calendar, as well as reeling events and other performances, with the performance and dance bands gradually merging.

When he retired from his work with General Accident, Jim was able to devote some more time to playing for country dancing, including travelling more widely, and he also had time to join the staff at Summer School. The band made several recordings, such as Book 8 for the Society (including two beautifully played 8x40 Strathspeys that probably get few airings), The Black Watch Ball covering popular reeling dances, and the Reel of the Puffins. The inclusion of a Mozart Horn Concerto and The Mexican Hat Dance on the latter (for the dance Marigold) shows Jim's continued interest in exploring the intersections of other musical styles with the Scottish dance floor, evident in the recording for the Formation Foundations book reviewed elsewhere in this issue. His CD of Christmas tunes for Scottish country dancing is still a big seller.

More recently, Jim and his present-day 'A Team' band made exemplary recordings for Society books 49 and 52, where the playing is absolutely top-notch, and he can be heard on several CDs partnering with Muriel Johnstone amongst others. The creativity and innovation that he continues to provide, for example the 'spooky' set for *Slytherin House*, which incorporates John Williams's Harry Potter tune, are first and foremost in service of the dance and the dancers, a principle he learnt early on from Bobby Crowe, and developed in his own style. That need not prevent the band giving dancers plenty to listen to, recognise and smile along with, while they are dancing, and he continues to bring huge pleasure in new recordings and to dance halls all over.

Happy Birthday, Jim!

More details of Bobby's story can found in the Scottish Traditional Music Hall of Fame, and on episode 16 of the Dance Scottish At Home podcast, still available on Soundcloud, in which Jim Lindsay shared his memories of playing with Bobby.

The Story behind the Dance: Meryl Thomson



A series of articles from Meryl Thomson delving behind the history of some of our dances and their music. In this article Meryl looks at how the RSCDS changed some original source dances to 40 bar versions.

Following on from my recent article in *The Reel* discussing why, especially as a musician, I dislike 40 bar dances in the repertoire, I thought it would be interesting to delve deeper into the occurrence of 40 bar dances

in RSCDS publications. I have considered RSCDS books and leaflets published since 1924. Just under 10% of dances in the main RSCDS books are 40 bar dances. Of course, some modern compositions have been deliberately written as 40 bar dances, whereas dances from the first 30 books have a more chequered history. I have chosen several dances from these older books to look at more closely - many older RSCDS 40 bar dances do not have a known source which makes it impossible to compare to an original, so I have picked from those for which I have sources.

Red House (Book 7) 48 bar Playford dance becomes a 40 bar reel

This dance appears as early as 1695 in *Playford's Dancing Master 9th edition* and in some of his later works as a 48 bar dance. There has been much written about the evolution of *Red House*. Read some of the threads on the SCDDB website my.strathspey.org/dd/dance/5497/#extrainfo. The RSCDS chose to halve the first 16 bars by having 1s set and cast and repeat back to place, taking 8 bars



instead of 16. This avoids having the 2s do nothing for 16 bars which is understandable for the modern dance repertoire, however what it does is wreck the pattern of the tune which would naturally be AABBCC. The RSCDS version uses an ABBCC pattern which fits the figures nicely but feels musically unbalanced to me, as if the first eight bars are an introduction to the rest of the tune.

Johnny McGill (Book 11) a 48 bar jig turned into 40 bars

The original tune for this dance is the same in the RSCDS book and their given source, William Boag's A Collection of Favorite Reels and Strathspeys 1797. The dance also appears in Broderip and Wilkinson's Admired Selection of Country Dances, Reels, Waltzes, Strathspeys and Cotillons from 1806 as a different dance but with the same tune.

includes '3rd Couple Promenad' it is unclear whether he meant couple three promenade round in eight bars or something else. Other dances in same Boag's collection which include a promenade state, "three Cu. Promenade round". How else could this 3rd Couple Promenad wording be interpreted? Boag Either corrected the terminology

The Boag

later dances in the book to clarify or he meant another figure perhaps? The RSCDS version omits this ambiguous figure which reduces the dance from 48 bars to 40. This affects the tune - the original 16 bar tune has repeated A and B sections which would need to be played in an AABBAB pattern for the 48 bar dance, whereas the RSCDS chose to have this played as ABABB for their 40 bar version. This popular tune was composed by John McGill of Girvan who was a dancing master and town piper.

The Laird of Dumbiedyke's Favorite (Book12) a 32 bar reel turned into 40 bars and turned back again

This dance was recently republished by the RSCDS in the *Sir Walter Scott, The Heart of Mid-Lothian* book and recorded on the accompanying album as a 32 bar dance. The original Book 12 version is 40 bars.



For Book 12, bars 9-16 were interpreted as 1s followed by 2s and 3s cast on own sides and cross below 3rd place and dance up on the opposite side. In bars 17-24 this is repeated back

to places. The most recent publication amends this to match the original with all 3 men chasing clockwise around the set and up on the men's side while all 3 ladies dance anticlockwise round the set, passing the men at the top and bottom of the set. The original from John Sutherland's *The Heart of Midlothian* from 1820 gives the instruction "1st Cu. lead 3 outsides opposite, back again to places". Easy to misconstrue.

Willie With his Tartan Trues (Book14) a 64 bar jig reduced to 40 bars

Who does not like a 64 bar dance danced eight times through? A 64 bar dance would have been more acceptable in the mid 1700s when a triple minor formation gave plenty of opportunity for flirting during the long periods of waiting in line to start dancing. Not so much in the modern ballroom with 4 couple sets.

difference is with the instruction 'Lead out each side and turn your partner'. There are many versions of lead outsides (probably enough for a whole article on the subject). Nicholas Dukes, writing in A Concise & Easy Method of Learning the Figuring Part of Country Dances in 1750, gives three different Lead out Sides figures. The version he gives for dancing after setting and turning corners is basically this - the 1s, who are in the middle position (and in the centre of the set), turn to face the men's side, dance between the 2nd and 3rd man, lady dances up and round 2nd man while man dances down and round 3rd man, they dance in, join hands and dance out between the 2nd and 3rd lady, lady dancing up and round 2nd lady while man dances down and round 3rd lady, they meet in the middle and turn two hands to end in progressed positions on their own side. Whether this would take 16 bars to dance is debatable unless you spend 8 bars turning your partner or spend longer than 8 bars to dance round before turning your partner. Ending improper on bar 40 in the RSCDS version and adding a different figure of advancing and retiring and turning 1.5 times to place makes for a

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more interesting dance. They could have chosen to finish the dance with set and turn corners ending in 2nd position proper and made this 32 bars which would be more pleasing musically but perhaps less interesting as a dance. The music has to be played ABABB to fit the dance in the RSCDS version.

The Bonniest Lass in all the World (Book 14) a 64 bar reel changed to a 40 bar strathspey

The original source of this dance comes from Peter Thompson's Compleat Collection of 200 Country Dances Vol 1 c.1751. The RSCDS dance is very similar to the original but takes less time for several of the formations, aided by changing from reel to strathspey.

Interestingly, this dance does finish with the same version of lead

outsides as mentioned in the previous dance although it is not called this in RSCDS terminology. The change from reel rhythm to strathspey necessitated a substitution of original tune from a rather


insipid tune in a minor key to one called Miss Coxe's Strathspey by a Mr McIntyre found in Gow's 5th Collection c.1809. The substituted tune is 'Slowly' annotated which suggests it perhaps was not intended be to



played for dancing. You can hear a 1951 recording by Jack Forsyth and his SCD Band at youtu.be/aP8zknqRis4?si=psxnliACQBj8PIKs note the fast tempo at 146bpm. The song *The Bonniest Lass in a'* the World was published in William Thomson's Orpheus Caledonius Volume 2 c.1725 and this would have worked as a slow air strathspey but for some reason was not chosen. Not being a great fan of slow air strathspeys, I am pleased the McIntyre tune was chosen as this gives more of a traditional Scottish feel in the music!

The Rakish Highlandman (Book 19) a 32 bar jig changed to 40 bar This Book 19 dance gives its source as Thomas Wilson's A Companion to the Ballroom 1816. Although the dance has figures which have the same names as the original, the RSCDS has different interpretations of these figures. Wilson as usual gives three versions of the dance, two "single figure" versions which are 16 bars long and the "double figure" one chosen by the RSCDS which in the original takes 32 bars.

Each starts with a reel or hey on your own sides followed by lead down the middle and up and allemande. Wilson's lead down and up is danced in 4 bars (1s end in 2nd place), leaving 4 bars for the allemande (couple linking arms and turning in the middle of the set). The RSCDS lead down and up and allemande are each


interpreted as 8 bars. There are several RSCDS dances Wilson's taken from collections which have to be adapted to fit the RSCDS method of dancing. The other figure which differs, although it takes the same number of 8 bars, is the Double Triangle. In his Complete System of Country Dancing of 1815 Wilson introduces some of his newly composed figures.

including the Double Triangle (see diagram). This figure appears in many of his subsequent dances, several used as sources for RSCDS dances.

Changing to a 40 bar dance means the 16 bar tune (the original is played AABB) has to be played with one of the 8 bar phrases repeated an extra time - the RSCDS chose to play ABABB. This is a pet hate of mine as it makes the tune feel unbalanced.

Bonnie Kate of Aberdeen (Book 17) a 32 bar dance changed to a 40 bar strathspey

Book 17 stands out for having the most 40 bars dances in one book - five of the 12. Bonnie Kate of Aberdeen is a dance taken from Peter Thompson's Compleat Collection Vol 3 1765-1772. There is an earlier version of the dance found in John Walsh's 24 Country Dances for 1751 and in the Universal Magazine of Knowledge and Pleasure also 1751. These have the same tune but different dance instructions. The RSCDS dance matches the Thompson original for the first 24 bars. Then the RSCDS version gives 8 bars for circle round and back and 8 bars for rights and lefts while the historical version expects 4 bars to circle 6 round and cross corners (right and left) in 4 bars, keeping the dance to 32 bars. It is not clear from the original music whether it should be played as a reel or a strathspey. The RSCDS chose not to use



the original tune, picking a tune by Peter Milne called Cropie's Strathspey which appeared in Middleton's Selection of Strathspeys, Reels ptr from 1870 Interestingly, this tune has mistakenly been attributed to Milne but was actually written by Alexander Given from

Kelso with the title Mr Douglas of Springwood Park's Strathspey in the late eighteenth century and published by Gow and Shepherd as a medley following a tune called Mrs Elliot's (Tiviotbank) Reel. Springwood Park in Kelso was bought by Admiral Sir James Douglas in 1750 but gradually became ruined and burnt down in the early 20th century. In my opinion the RSCDS made a good decision, as the tune they chose is far superior to the original. The only negative is having to play this as a 40 bar tune in the pattern ABABB.

Lord Hume's Reel (Book 16) 32 bar dance changed to a 40 bar strathspey



This dance is another from Wilson's Companion to the Ballroom. Again. the difference in bars is due to Wilson's short lead down and back in 4 bars followed by a 4 bar chain figure whereas the RSCDS has 8 bars for the lead down and 8 bars for rights and lefts. In his 1815 Complete Guide, Wilson notes of the chain figure "The movement of this Figure is similar to the

Quadrille 'Right and Left' it is generally performed in four bars of the music, while the Quadrille 'Right and Left' is made to require eight bars, this difference arises from the number and manner of applying the steps". He later states "This is the figure that has been erroneously taken for the Country Dance 'Right and Left'". This is another dance which could have been danced as a reel rather than strathspey as it is annotated 'Allegro' which means fast.

The tune may have been written for Alexander Home, 10th Earl of Home (11 November 1769 - 21 October 1841) who was a British politician and representative peer of Scotland between 1807 and 1841. He was one of the first people to import Newfoundland dogs later known as Labrador Retrievers to the UK as gundogs and these are commonly believed to be the ancestors of modern labradors.

We can see that changes to make dances for a modern audience more interesting than the original can create a knock-on effect. Changing the length of figures or removing them necessitates altering the music to fit. When this results in a 40 bar dance it is at the expense of ruining the feel of the tune by forcing it into an uneven number of phrases. As there are very few 40 bar tunes, even entirely replacing the original tune does not help with the problem of 40 bar dances.

Branch Burns Ceilidh 13 January 2024

For many years I've been coming to this ceilidh hosted by the RSCDS London Branch at St Columba's Church Hall in Knightsbridge and without fail, after the last willow has been stripped, I have been left eagerly waiting for the date of the ceilidh the following January. Saturday's event was no exception. Obviously a well oiled machine, always well presented and organised, this particular event is one I have come to rely on to kickstart me and the 20 or so friends that my partner and I bring, into the new year. Last year I perceived quite a surge in numbers at the ceilidh after two years of enforced cancellation thanks to covid so I wondered if the attendance last night would equal that of last year's event or if the numbers might dwindle. Neither turned out to be the case. The attendance last night actually surpassed that of last year with a large age range making up the throng. So full was St Columba's Hall that 'round the room' dances had to be done with an outer and inner circle and sometimes another circle inside that. Our most welcoming host for the evening was James Fairbairn who called the dances expertly and who was always on hand to give the odd bit of extra tuition on the floor to any newcomers finding their stride.



James also addressed the haggis just before dinner ably introduced and played out by his son Fergus Fairbairn on the bagpipes. James' dance selection for the evening was a well-conceived mix of the very familiar, the less familiar and the brand new. This created a very satisfying evening of dance for seasoned ceilidh goers and newcomers alike and was in itself a talking point of the evening. A brand-new ceilidh dance to me and most others was *The Siege of Ennis*. An Irish dance originally, I believe, it started with the less usual formation of four facing four across the room rather than up and down and contained more unusual moves like couples side-stepping to change places on the sides followed by a central star leaving the end couples turning independently. All in all, a satisfying ceilidh dance with a little more involvement giving anyone new a taste of what Scottish dancing might feel like.

Of course, an event like this could not happen without an extraordinary team working tirelessly for the smooth running of the evening and for years now RSCDS London has consistently demonstrated a commitment of this nature to their Burns Ceilidh. The organisation of the ceilidh is truly a team effort with what must be a host of helpers, but we must mention the catering team. Feeding the numbers we saw on Saturday night was no mean feat and this year dinner was served in takeaway style cartons. Traditional and vegetarian haggis was offered as usual along with tea and shortbread. The catering team included Margaret Shaw and her daughter Sarah, sisters Eilidh, Mairi and Treenie Stewart, Lena Robinson, Pam and Tony Ellam, Margaret Catchick and others whose names I did not manage to get, but who were all undoubtedly heroes of the evening. The engine of a ceilidh is its band and who better to fill the evening with the inspiration and energy for dancing than the Caledonian Reelers. Mary Felgate on fiddle, Derek Chappell on accordion and Freddie Felgate on drums played the night away with zest, showing off their range from a sensitive St Bernard's Waltz to rounding off the dancing with a particularly energetic Strip The Willow. A treat indeed to have live music of this standard.

In conclusion I cannot recommend this event enough. It is an evening of broad grins and laughter, dancing with friends, dancing with strangers, making mistakes... more laughter. It is perfect for complete beginners and experienced dancers, young, old, everyone in between and may RSCDS London branch continue this wonderful Burns Night for years to come.

The Glenfinnan Monument, a 60 foot high stone tower at the head of Loch Shiel, was erected in 1815 to mark the Jacobite uprising led by the young pretender, Charles Edward Stuart. The gathering of the loyal clans took place there in 1745. It can be seen when travelling by train from the Glenfinnan Viaduct. The highlander on top was added in 1835 and was purported to represent Bonnie Prince Charlie.

Branch Committee Report:

Meeting 19 January 2024



Joanne Lawrence, Chair of RSCDS London Branch, welcomed the Committee to the first meeting of 2024. She reported that the season continued to go well with good numbers of people attending classes and dances. The Burns

Night Ceilidh, always a very popular event in the Branch's calendar, had been attended by 199 people.

Following the Executive Officers' reports, the Committee turned its attention to the sub-Committees' work. Margaret Shaw, Convenor of the Dances sub-Committee, is already planning the New Season Dance to be held in September. This year the event will be in the form of a tea dance at Maria Fidelis School. The Committee hopes that by changing the event to an afternoon dance, more dancers may be encouraged to attend and celebrate the start of the 2024-2025 season.

Joanne reported on behalf of the Class sub-Committee members who continue to plan and arrange a variety of classes for dancers to enjoy. She was delighted to report that the Children's Class is going to be relaunched on 4 February. The monthly classes will take place at St Columba's after the Sunday School. The October Day School will take place again this year, but at Maria Fidelis School. Joanne commented on how popular Maria Fidelis School was proving to be as a venue. Due to the excellent transport links, members of groups from around the South-east are able to attend the monthly Technique and Fast Paced Social class on a regular basis. Following the success of the DAA (Intermediate) Course held in Spring / Summer 2023, the Branch will be offering another DAA course later in the year - the level will depend on the demand. (see p5)

An update from the Communications sub-Committee then followed. Committee members agreed that the new website (designed by Chris Collings) is a great asset, with online booking of classes and dances now available. The promoting of Branch events on a range of social media platforms continues to attract younger dancers to events. It is encouraging to see more younger people supporting both classes and dances.

Since Richard Clarke was appointed as Vice-Chair, he has played a lead role on the Committee in overseeing the review of a number of Branch documents and policies, for example *Care and Consideration in Dance* which became available on the website in 2023. The Committee members agreed with Richard's suggestion of finalising a five-year strategic plan for the Branch, which could be presented to Branch members at the AGM in June.

The last agenda item was a reminder that nominations for Committee members will close on 31 March. RSCDS Management Board: Simon Wales

The Management Board (MB) met in Glasgow on 25 November 2023, and here are the highlights:

The Management Board agreed to propose that Lizzy Conder be reappointed for a second three-year term as Treasurer at the 2024 AGM. As the Treasurer is a

critical role with Governance implications, the board also decided to begin the process of recruiting the next treasurer in 2024.

The MB conducted a thorough review of panels and working groups and agreed a framework for all Board appointed groups. The framework includes term limits for members, clearly defined remits and goals and transparent recruitment processes for group vacancies. Going forward there will be an annual review of groups and panels and they will be formed and dissolved as needed.

The Board reviewed attendance numbers, budgets and format for the recent AGM weekend. This more detailed update on Management Board discussions is a direct result of the Meet the Board session.

Based on feedback from dancers who attended Winter School 2023, there are two main changes to Winter School 2024.

1. No combined class - this was popular in 2022, but feedback from 2023 has been negative.

2. For 2024, we have made arrangements to use a function room at the Fishers Hotel instead of the Sports Hall.

The proposal to raise Unit 1 fee from £25 to £35 was approved by the MB. This is still well below the cost to deliver and is heavily subsidised. To balance this cost increase, Unit 1 Manuals will be a free resource for candidates, in line with the publishing strategy to provide free resources to members. Any current unit 1 candidates who have paid for their manual will be refunded.

Following strong sales at Summer School and bulk orders from branches, Book 53 has sold out. A reprint of the book and reorder of the CDs has been approved. Projects for 2024 were discussed including plans for Book 54, and a new members pack.

The Junior magazine is now available to non-members at £6 from the online shop. The magazine is free for RSCDS junior members. Youth Services confirmed the launch of a new Family Scholarship for Summer School 2024. The Scholarship will cover the cost of one week residential or non-residential. It is available to anyone under 18 and will not be means tested.

The main reason for meeting in Glasgow was to be present for the unveiling of the plaque commemorating the founding of the Society on 26 November 1923, in the Athenaeum Theatre (now Hard Rock Café). Not the most likely of bedfellows, but the Café staff looked after us well and the members of the RSCDS experienced a different side of life and music! We all danced in Buchanan Street afterwards too amongst the Christmas shoppers and street entertainers!
