

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# PayPal and Direct Debit options now available



London Branch members, and subscribers to The Reel, can now pay for their renewals and subscriptions through PayPal and Direct Debit. Those members who wish to continue to use cheques will be able to do so, but cheques are being used less and less and being replaced by transactions, which most people who are on the internet find greatly simplifies payments. These payment options are available www.rscdslondon.org.uk/shop

Using PayPal, payment can be made simply by entering card details at the time of payment, or through setting up a PayPal account. Account set up requires just an email address and password, or mobile number and PIN, in which case there is no need to re-enter your card details every time you pay. In order to cover costs, a small charge of 50p will be levied for payment by PayPal. For example, when you pay London Branch membership by PayPal, the cost will be £22.50, if you choose to receive The Reel in electronic format only, or £24.50 if you choose to continue to receive The Reel in the post in the UK. # **London Branch Day School**

#### **Dancer's Report**

A "hushed October morning mild", as Robert Frost has it, brought us once again to the London Branch Day School. Paddington Academy is feeling like 'home' now, and familiar faces at registration and behind the tea urns welcomed us again. Thank you, all you London Branch volunteers!

It was a pleasure once again to be taught by excellent teachers, accompanied by fine musicians. Antoine Rousseau's morning technique class started the day in energetic style: his instruction to conserve energy with low impact walk-throughs, alternating with high impact springs and step practice with elevation, as he prepared dancers to dance The Menzies Rant from Book 7. Perhaps it was not exactly a theme, but the selection of mostly early dances challenged dancers to think about technique as they tackled less familiar transitions, formations and progressions. Still with a focus on low impact step practice, Antoine looked for good posture and reach in strathspey time, with accurate foot positions, for the rather stately Duke of Hamilton's Reel from Book 5. The musician for this class was Andrew Nolan, on the piano, and it was a delight to hear his light and dancing style as he accompanied The Glens of Angus from Book 23. The class ended with the unfamiliar again, as Antoine took us through The Princess Royal - a 28 bar reel from Book 2, with a recognisably 18th century tune.

In the afternoon, the class was taken by Deb Lees, sympathetically accompanied by Barbara Manning on the fiddle. A warm-up dance with a complex clapping rhythm proved rather challenging, but Deb's request for attack and flight in skip change met with more success. Taking the class through *The Argyll Square*, a Roy Goldring jig from Book 43, Deb worked on the distinctive interlocking reel of four, in which each dancer starts from the middle of the reel, before putting the dance together and reminding us of the flight needed. Moving into strathspey time, Deb reminded us of our posture, and the need to keep heads up to avoid strain on the back. Deb broke down some formations for the next dance, The Argyll Ludging from Book 36, demonstrating and making sure dancers knew where they should finish. The last dance of the afternoon was a MacNab dance often used in demonstration: The Earl of Errol's Reel. Again, Deb demonstrated each section to make sure dancers were secure, before it was danced through, for the most part successfully.

After tea, I went along to Joan Desborough's session entitled 'A Tribute to Ann Dix'. Joan was a great friend of Ann's, and took dancers through some of Ann's interesting and unusual formations (typical of Ann, we learned, was to introduce 'quirky bits' that nevertheless flowed well), interspersed with anecdotes and memories. Joan began with The First of September, and coached it as Ann might have done - looking for good phrasing and covering. The musician was Judith Muir on accordion, who played an inspiring set of tunes. Other dances reflected Ann's friendships and family, including the last dance she devised, the strathspey Miss Eleanor, written for her granddaughter, and published in Book 49.

The day ended with a dance to excellent music from the musicians' class, and incorporating some ceilidh items. Altogether a delightful day – thank you to Margaret Catchick and her team for another excellent day school.

# Musicians' workshop with Nicol McLaren

Saturday 17 October saw Paddington Academy once again filled with dancers, musicians and cake. I don't know how many of these days I have been to over the years - I have lost count but they never fail to fill me with happiness and persuade me it is worth getting up early on a Saturday morning. When I and my fiddling buddy Jo arrived, the music room was already filled with a great selection of accordions, concertinas, keyboards, fiddles and some drums, and of course their owners - some of whom are now old friends as well as some new faces. We were under the command of the lovely Nicol McLaren who had come all the way from Scotland that very morning. He was upbeat, funny and friendly and soon got us all playing together as a band, enjoying his excellently puttogether sets full of perky and enjoyable tunes, and explained to us how he went about preparing them. The music was relatively challenging and kept us all on our toes, with a few crazy pieces thrown in to see what we were really made of. Initially, sets like The Castle of Mey and The Montgomeries' Rant struck fear into the hearts of all but the bravest souls, but after picking it apart with Nicol we were able to produce pretty respectable versions. There were also some nice harmony lines, hand crafted especially for the fiddles, which I particularly enjoyed.

This year was the first time the musicians had played for the full evening dance and it was a definite improvement. Apart from the fact that it seems a shame not to share what we had been practising all day, it was a relief this year not to have to inflict my dancing on anybody. And anyway, it's a joy to play for dances. For me, as a musician one of the most wonderful things about playing Scottish dance music, ever since the very first time I came to one of the RSCDS days about ten years ago, is the response we get from the dancers. It is so incredibly rewarding to get positive feedback from them - to see heads bobbing up and down enthusiastically over the top of my music stand, feet moving even when it isn't their turn to dance, to get smiles and claps and encouraging cheers and have to replay some of the sets is just lovely. So, thank you, RSCDS London, for giving us the opportunity to take part in both the day and the evening, to all the other musicians for being one of the best bands we have ever had, and to Nicol for a fantastic. useful and hugely entertaining day.

# **South East Region Teachers' Association**

Paul Plummer led the latest SERTA workshop entitled 'Putting on a Display', held on 27 September at Finchampstead. Having been a demonstration dancer since childhood, and the teacher of the London demonstration class for many years, he was able to bring first-hand experience to the subject. Peter Jenkins had worked with Paul as the demonstration class and provided excellent musician throughout.

Displays can be semi-professional corporate events, a display with participation such as Burns' Suppers, or entertainment at an old folks' home. Whatever the type of display, the audience is likely to be looking mainly from the waist up. An entertaining display needs smiles, eye contact and engagement between the dancers, good posture and good covering, with dancers in the right place at the right time. Paul's warm-up included emphasis on many of these requirements, making sure that we looked up and at each other, smiled and maintained an upright relaxed posture throughout. It sounds simple, but it was surprising how different it felt.

The teacher should consider the abilities of the dancers and what looks good to an audience when devising a display. Good footwork is needed, but not necessarily high impact dancing. A display programme may be quite demanding for a small team if they are all required to dance most of the time. Whilst a strathspey may fill more time, it can get dull for an audience expecting more lively dances. Paul also taught us a few simple highland steps and a simple Broadswords, which increase variety for the audience

Good display dances may not be the dancers' favourites. The complexity of Schiehallion reels may be fun for the dancers, but the simple patterns in Round Reel of Eight are more easily understood by the audience. It is also a great dance for covering, eye contact and engagement.

After lunch, Paul's emphasis was on developing spatial awareness. A simple dance such as *Linton Ploughman* can be modified to change its orientation. This will increase interest for the audience, but requires focus from the dancers. The covering and shapes must still be good, and of course with smiles and good posture and no evidence of the concentration required. We also looked at how dances may be adapted to link with the next dance in a choreographed medley. If the team is dependent on recorded music it may be necessary to modify a dance or a medley to fit recorded tracks, unless someone can splice tracks together.

Finally, Paul put together the dances and medleys we had learned into a display programme. Everyone joined in and put into practice what we had learned.

It was an enjoyable day with lots of practical tips for display organisers and dancers alike. Displays provide an excellent showcase for Scottish dancing and raise funds for branches and clubs. Our thanks to Paul, and to Peter, whose music kept us dancing all day. Thanks also to the BHS Border Branch for providing tea, coffee and



#### New RSCDS Book for Young Dancers

# A Prima Ballerina's perspective on Scottish Country Dancing

Seeing an individual bounding like a gazelle up to the top floor flat in her house in Maida Vale, Rosalind Zuridis realized it was none other than recently retired prima ballerina Leanne Benjamin, OBE. As a lifelong dance fan, she couldn't resist finding out more about Leanne's perspective on dance in general, and exploring what she would make of Scottish country dancing.

I sat opposite Leanne Benjamin in a restaurant and watched her sinuous hands curling, unfolding and spreading through a multitude of tiny movements. She was explaining to me how, before dancing, she would start to loosen up her body, starting with her hands. It was meticulous, powerful and beautiful, and I immediately began to comprehend how such a dancer attends to the preparation of her body. I had invited Leanne to talk about her ballet career and then to give me her views on Scottish country dancing: I realized that the occasion would be full of valuable insights.

Leanne grew up in Queensland, Australia. She started dancing at the age of four, and came to England, to train with the Royal Ballet School, at the tender age of 16. She worked with the Sadler's Wells, the English National and the Deutsche Oper ballets before joining the Royal Ballet. She was accepted into the Royal Ballet in 1992, becoming a first soloist that same year and a principal in 1993. She danced with the company for the next 21 years before retiring in 2013. Renowned for her roles such as Stravinsky's *Firebird* and Odette/Odile in *Swan Lake*, she has been the recipient of many dancing awards and was awarded the OBE in 2005. Her dancing has been praised, amongst much else, for its musicality, emotional expressiveness and dramatic partnering.

Leanne had done Scottish dancing as a child, but during her ballet career had only been reintroduced to it via the 1985 ballet, "The Flowers of the Forest," choreographed by David Bintley. This ballet, full of whirling kilted dancers, commemorates the Battle of Flodden Field of 1513, where thousands of Scottish nobles perished in a battle against the English. Apart from this, Leanne has not been much acquainted with our passion. Consequently, I gave her an overview of the modern origins of SCD, starting with its revitalization by Miss Milligan and Mrs Stewart in the 1920s, through to its worldwide presence and influence. She was impressed by our great treasury of dances and was also interested to see the notation SCD has evolved such as in RSCDS books and Pilling.

With the excellent help of YouTube, Leanne and I watched a variety of Scottish country dancing, ranging from some top demonstration dancers through to footage taken at dances and balls up and down the country.


First, we watched the demonstration team 'Paris and Friends' dance the strathspey *My Friend Joe* (Newcastle 2015). Leanne was very impressed by their elegance and control, by their ability to link the formations into a seamless whole, and by their superb posture. In her opinion, the secret of good posture is to develop a strong core, via the abdomen and back muscles and to concentrate on the power of the legs, so as to enable the upper body – the neck, head, shoulders and arms – to move freely and with grace.

We then watched a performance of *The Shepherd's Crook*, which was danced outside, with the white dresses, bright sashes and kilts looking stunning against green lawns. (Birmingham RSCDS, Leeds 2011). Leanne commented on the communal drama of the whole dance and the intricacy of the Highland steps: she was clearly drawn to the more complex choreography where at some points one of the trio is dancing solo whilst the other two turn together.

We then watched a couple of five-couple dances, in particular Hugh Foss' wonderful *Polharrow Burn*. Leanne was attracted by the speed and vivacity of this dance, its loosened-up structure and its choreographic brilliance. She felt that complex dances such as these were really worth watching from above,

and compared this visual richness to the patterns created by the corps de ballet in dances such as *Swan Lake*.

As we talked, I could see that my interviewee was impressed by SCD's major characteristics: the skills of dancing in a group, the emphasis on elegance, good posture and complex footwork, our wide repertoire of dances and the great satisfaction we all gain from the communal experience of moving to music.

Nevertheless, Leanne is a soloist and a superb athlete and so her reactions to our style of dancing were sure to be illuminating. Leanne stood up at this point in our discussion:

"I would really like to see more height brought into the experience," she said. "Why are the men the only ones to project their body upwards? The ladies should use their arms more." Here she demonstrated, extending her arms, wrists and fingers upwards with great fluidity. "When you dance your whole body needs to be part of the movement."

Similarly, she advocated increasing the range of setting steps into more dances, incorporating those such as in *The Shepherd's Crook*. She felt that this would enrich the dances.

Finally, she clearly found that the basic choreography of most dances (first couple/ interacting with the couples below) rather restricting. "Why not a trio? Or a solo?"

I therefore asked her how she would feel if she were part of a SCD set. She smiled: "I think that after a while I would just want to fly off on my own!"

The conversation did then turn to those things that ballet and Scottish country dancing have in common. Leanne spoke of the fundamental importance of dancers maximizing the way they move and the shapes they form. "When I assess a dancer the first quality I look for is how they move through space." Perfectly shaped reels and the graceful linking of formations come to mind!

Leanne also stressed the importance of really connecting with your partner. She feels that eye contact is very important in maintaining the synergy between dancers and this, I feel, will ring a bell for Scottish country dancers! For ballerinas, she said, a great male partner is one whose strength and involvement enables and facilitates the ballerina's dancing.

Leanne also emphasized other elements that we all know, such as thinking ahead and remaining aware of the others moving around you. I retained the vivid impression of her always being alert to everything happening in the dance.

Finally, we came to the dancer and music and at this point Leanne surprised me. For her, the one great link with the music and the timing is the conductor: the dancer can almost always see their movements and this relationship helps the rhythm and drive of the performance. When we talked about the effect of music on dancers, she told me that almost as soon as the music starts she knows whether she will enjoy the dancing.

"If I have great music I get really inspired." I think we can all agree with that!

# **LETTERS TO THE EDITOR & CLUB NEWS**

Where is London's Pride?

Dear Jeremy,

What have the dance titles *Just as I was in the Morning* and *Red House* in common with the dance *None so Pretty?* Nothing at present, but they should have! *Just as I was...* and *Red House* can also be called respectively, by their alternative titles *The Deuk's dang ow're my Daddie* and *Where would bonnie Annie lie?* London Branch members will of course recognise *London Pride* as the alternative name for *None So Pretty*.

On 14 May 1974 Miss Jean Milligan wrote in reply to Dr Ellen Garvie: "I will certainly see that in any reprint of that book [the 1957 publication Book 19] the two names go in and also get in to the habit of referring to it as *None so Pretty* or *London Pride*." And this was then reported in *The Reel* 129: "Dr Garvie drew attention (at the 1974 Branch AGM) to an agreement by Miss Milligan to the re-naming of the dance *None so Pretty* to *London Pride* as the alternative title. The change will be incorporated into the relative book on reprint."

Following the euphoria in 1974 of this commitment, the then next two branch dances announced that we would be dancing the dance *London Pride*. Sadly, this feeling faded as nothing happened in reprints of Book 19, and London Branch returned to referring to the dance as *None so Pretty*. This was the state for the following 24 years, when this then popular dance appeared with great regularity on dance programmes sometimes even occurring several times a year. However, since then it has rarely appeared yet, on two of these occasions the alternative name *London Pride* was used. And at our 85th Anniversary dance held on 31 October, Branch chairman, Andrew Kellett reminded us again of this agreement made some 40 years earlier (yet never honoured by HQ). An A5 version of Book 19 was reprinted in 2012, but with no such revision.

Wilson Nicol (in his well-researched article in *The Reel* 282) says that Ellen Garvie raised this situation in 2002 with HQ but to no avail. Shouldn't this state of affairs be at last remedied?

#### 50 Years of Bournemouth Branch

This year has been a proud year for the RSCDS Bournemouth Branch, celebrating 50 years from 6 August 1965, the date that Bournemouth Reel Club was officially granted RSCDS status. The move was instigated by Ron Watson and Iain Cameron, another member. Ron had gained his certificates some years earlier and had been teaching in Eastleigh, before moving to Bournemouth. He then encouraged Joan Horrocks, another member of the group, to attend St Andrews to take her teaching certificates, in order to fulfil the criteria of having two qualified RSCDS teachers to form a Branch.

As with all groups, over the years we have seen many ups and downs, but nevertheless we have kept going. At the time of being accepted as an RSCDS branch, the Club had four thriving classes each week: beginner/improvers and intermediate/advanced, each of which had 60 to 80 members; a demonstration class of 16 top notch dancers (entry by invitation only); and a large children's class. Each year the Branch held day schools, always attended by at least 100 dancers with classes for all levels, including highland, which Bobby Munro taught for many years.

Sadly, as the years have rolled by, age has claimed so many members, but we struggle on trying to gain more by moving areas and delivering 6,000 leaflets door to door (this did not get the expected result). We are very proud to have achieved 50 years of amazing happiness with thanks for during this time, to teachers and committee members who have enabled us to keep going.

We extend a very warm welcome to all to attend our Anniversary Ball (see advertisement opposite), held after our anniversary year due to all prior dates being fully booked. Please come and swell the numbers dancing to Marian Anderson and Her SCD Band.

A Sense of Direction

Dear Jeremy,

I think that the RSCDS has lost its sense of direction. It was set up to preserve traditional Scottish dancing, and it did not publish recently composed dances until after WW2. The first to be included was *The Reel of the 51st Division*, which was devised by highland officers in a prisoner of war camp in Germany. The division had formed the rearguard at Dunkirk and it had not been possible to include it in the evacuation. The dance was No 10 in Book 13, the Victory Book, and it was a worthy exception.

Nowadays, the Society churns out book after book of newly composed dances. There is no reason why it should not publish contemporary dances – publication of descriptions of dances is Object (c) of its Constitution, and it does not specify that they should only be those found in old documents. Unfortunately, the pendulum has swung heavily to the other extreme. I have been through Books 42 to 45 and can find no dances from historical sources.

Books of new dances have always been written and published. In the 18th century they seemed to come out almost every year, and it is natural for people to wish to commemorate special events. Nevertheless, the RSCDS was not set up to produce these books. Recent ones have not even been given to members as a subscription issue, which is why my research stopped at Book 45. Classes at St Andrews Summer School are now largely given over to learning the dances in the latest book. When I started dancing regularly, 40 years ago, I went to classes to learn the technique of dancing and, after a while, began going to dances. It was possible to learn a great deal on the dance floor because there were far fewer dances in those days and by that time I was familiar with the basic figures. Nowadays there is a tendency to throw beginners in at the deep end. On one occasion a lady came to my local club. She had little experience of dancing and the first dance that someone asked her for was The Blackwater Reel. This is fairly complicated and at that time had only just been published, so nobody at the club knew it very well. The result was chaos, and the lady never came back.

The RSCDS needs to get back to basics. It should leave publication of modern dances to others, except for those few that commemorate events and personalities connected with the Society, and concentrate on teaching the skills that will allow newcomers to enjoy dancing the huge repertoire available today.

#### Antony Morris: 24 October 1923 – 13 August 2015

Tony Morris was a member of Tunbridge Wells Branch from its formation in 1976. He trained as a civil engineer and his career spanned post war reconstruction in Britain, overseas postings in Bahrain, Malaysia and Tanzania followed by other overseas projects and three years working in the UK before retirement. Tony and his wife Barbara married in 1949 and in 1962 they bought the house in Pembury near Tunbridge Wells where they still lived 53 years later.

Once settled in the UK, Tony became Branch Chairman for eight years followed by many years as the Branch President. Meanwhile, Barbara served as Branch Secretary for 15 years and is now the Branch President. Tony very often attended the beginners' classes, as he liked to welcome them to the Branch and assist them in their dancing. They attended many dances throughout the South East as well as taking many dance holidays in the UK and the continent. Tony and Barbara's commitment to the Branch has been unstinting throughout all these years and they were presented with Branch awards in 2005.

Tony celebrated his 90th birthday at the Branch dance in 2013 and was still dancing in April this year aged 91. Tony's other love was sailing which he did round the world, as well as owning yachts in the UK. Other interests included the UK Bahrain Society, Finchcocks Musical Museum, gardening and golf.

Tracks include music suitable for a Canadian Barn Dance, a 4x32 jig, Scottish Waltz, Marches (2/4 into 6/8), Eva Three-step and an 8x32 reel.

Timing has conspired against us on this occasion, with new releases from Luke Brady's Band and D.u.K (a Society recording of 12 dances from *Miss Milligan's Miscellany*, plus four band tracks) not arriving in time for review in this issue.

For a Christmas suggestion, therefore, we head 'off the beaten track', with the Tom Orr Band, who reflect what might be called the modern ceilidh style of playing, heard from Alasdair MacCuish and others, bringing flavours of jazz and other genres to Scottish music. This was evident previously on his tracks for the



recording, made in conjunction with the RSCDS, for the Commonwealth Ceilidh (see *The Reel* 289). In an interview on *Take the Floor* during the summer, Tom reflected on his influences, including Alasdair MacCuish and Iain MacPhail. One common feature between these two is evident here: the orchestration of music, so that each member of the traditional line-up six-piece band has a clearly defined role, combining to deliver a superbly integrated sound supporting and complementing the melody throughout. Iain MacPhail's band was introduced on some occasions as an 'orchestra' for this very reason.

On this occasion the recording is not geared to the Scottish country dancer, so it is more a case of sitting back, though those relaxing may be rudely awakened by the thunderous opening piano chord that leads into a high octane rendition of Gordon Duncan's *Thunderstruck* on the opening track. It is followed by up-tempo sets of jigs and reels, beautiful slow airs, including *Lochanside*, giving a great mix of traditional (such as *The Irish Washerwoman*) and modern tunes (Robert Black and Phil Cunningham among the composers), well-balanced to showcase the full band, including Marie Fielding (fiddle), Fraser MacInnes (drums) and Brian Cruickshank (bass). It will certainly get your toes tapping, and perhaps rolling back the carpet for a quick ceilidh dance in front of the Christmas tree.






