RSCDS AGM 8 November 2014, Perth

We were warned it was going to be a long meeting, and it was, but a significant step was taken when the AGM agreed to change the Society's legal status from an unincorporated association of members to a Company Limited by Guarantee (CLG). This has been under discussion for over four years, and a vote was needed before it was passed on this occasion. A CLG provides greater protection for our Trustees from personal financial liability, but should not impact on how branches are run, though the role of the Branch delegates will change slightly.

The Management Board proposed a number of Constitutional amendments. Some of these passed without debate: a reduction in the number of Trustees, a change to the reporting line for the Society Archivist, and making it optional for the Society to have a President (we don't have a Society President at the moment, though of course London does have a Branch President).

Two further amendments were rejected by the meeting, with London to the fore in opposing both: the Management Board wanted to change the remit of the Membership Services Committee from all matters concerning public relations, publications, marketing and services to members and branches to publications only. London Branch argued successfully that such a move was the wrong strategic direction for the Society to take at this time. We do not need new books and more dances; what we do want are new dancers and more members. The Board also proposed that it should have the power to amend the Society's Rules and Procedures without approval from the AGM, only reporting to the AGM after the event. This affront to democracy was rejected.

We were told that the Society is in a strong financial position, thanks in part to some generous donations, and the decline in membership may have slowed because numbers are increasing in continental Europe.

Most candidates for positions on the Management Committee were successful without the need for an election, but there was a vote for Chairman Elect, which Helen Russell won. She will succeed to the Chairmanship in two years' time. Congratulations to her, and to Jim Healy, who took over as Chairman from John Wilkinson. They have many challenges to face, and London Branch will do our best to support them.

1970s early established him as top band musician, working with most of the legendary names from the golden era of Scottish dance music and you will find him on the credits for countless dance recordings [see p9 and also p12 for



his part in Bobby Crowe's Band].

Jim formed his own band in the 1980s which quickly became renowned for his innovative arrangements and concert performances. Their popular brand of listening music is regularly featured on the BBC and their critically acclaimed *Free Hand* CD inspired a generation of young Scottish musicians.

In recent years Jim has brought the two strands of his music career together, playing and recording for dancing under his own name. His band is firmly established as one of the most popular for Scottish country dances in the UK, and he has performed across Europe, North America, New Zealand and China. His Christmas Dance Party CD brought a smile to faces all around the world and recent recordings include a CD with Muriel Johnstone [see p13] and The Black Watch Ball and Reel of the Puffins CDs with his own hand

Spring Fling - London 17-19 April 2015

Whether you are between 12 and 35 years old, whether you know someone in that age range, or whether being 35 is a distant memory, there will be something for everyone at the Spring Fling London 2015 weekend on 17-19 April next year. This page details all you will need to know about the weekend.

London and the huge amount of SCD going on there make it an ideal venue

Spring Fling is an RSCDS residential course for young dancers organised by young dancers with the help and support of HQ and local dancers. Unlike Summer and Winter school, the venue of Spring Fling (SF) changes each year and last year moved abroad for the first time to Lyon. Venues tend to concentrate on areas where there are already groups of young dancers, but never before has the weekend been held in the capital. With the huge amount of SCD going on, London is an ideal venue for the weekend.

Lead organiser and London Branch member, Elaine Davies is responsible for the preparation and smooth running of the weekend. "I was keen to stay true to the roots of SF and give young and youthful teachers a springboard for their talents", she said, commenting on her choice of teachers and musicians, "I'm really pleased with the line up and am sure it will bring in dancers from the UK and abroad".

We were challenged by a couple of dances from the newly re-published Imperial dance book, and Micah Thompson on the fiddle gave us a different style of music from that of the piano in the morning, but still helped us get lift off the harder sports hall floor, while playing enjoyable tunes.

Following afternoon tea, Graham took a class in highland steps for the *Foursome Reel* and *Reel of Tulloch*. Although the allotted time for the session was limited, Graham managed to teach and have the very mixed class achieve sufficient steps to complete the dance.

The ceilidh in the evening brought in some extra dancers to participate and enjoy the balanced mix of ceilidh dances, country dances and items. The day school music course students, led by Ian Muir, played a rousing selection of tunes, competently and professionally, for the first four dances of the evening. We were also treated to items including: songs by Alice Stainer, a classical duet on fiddles, Ian and Judith Muir showing their versatility on accordions and a magnificent display of footwork and agility by three of the younger dancers, demonstrating the Seann Truibhas.

A successful day like this, which flowed smoothly and effortlessly for the dancers, only happened because Margaret and her committee had worked hard at all the details. We departed from the school tired but having enjoyed a great day of classes, socialising and dancing.

"Swing the Quavers" Musicians' Day School

This year the Musicians' Workshop at the London Branch Day School on 18 October was led by Ian Muir of the ever popular Craigellachie Band. Four violins, three button accordions, three keyboards and a drummer attended and Ian explained that the music he had provided was all in different styles and arrangements, including ceilidh music to encourage the youngsters into dancing, and also for which we would be playing that evening. As Ian said, we were all on a musical journey, and always learning, and so it was to be throughout the day.

We started playing the traditional single reel *Kingussie Flower*, with accordions required to be crisp, and violins using the top end of the bow. After listening and appreciating the phrasing within the tune, we were beginning to sound quite a coherent group. The double reel (more notes to get our fingers round) set of music was next, and we gradually improved, especially when Ian got us to accent a particular note or "swing the quaver", as one violinist said. One of the tunes, *Laxaburn*, was tricky, but the notes were "only a guide", and we were shown how to pick out the important ones that made up the tune.

The music for the ceilidh dances was rehearsed: Ian had cleverly orchestrated the *Gay Gordons* into three parts, and, in part of the *St Bernard's Waltz*, the strings took the lead with the accordions playing just single reeds. Strathspeys and pipe marches were also covered and, perhaps surprisingly, discussions on how body movement helps in our playing.

We played for the first four dances for the evening ceilidh, but sneaked in the *Leasks of Lerwick* as a warm up as well. So, many thanks to Ian Muir for his guidance, and London Branch for running the workshop – we'd love to play for the whole evening next year!

South East Region Teachers' Association

The latest SERTA workshop on 'Getting the best out of your dancers' was held in Hemel Hempstead on 28 September. It was led by Sue Porter from Oban, Convenor of the Education and Training Committee, and Barbara Manning was our musician. Using discussion and practical dancing, Sue covered a lot of ground, from welcoming new dancers to low impact adjustments for less mobile dancers. During the day, Sue used dances from the new Graded Book 3. This includes many more strathspeys, and dances to introduce more complex formations in otherwise simple dances. The book and accompanying CD are now available and recommended!

Good class preparation, a positive manner, enthusiasm and humour, and appropriate dress were covered. Lesson planning should consider the music, the venue and the class make up. Consult the musician, and give them ample time to prepare, or if using CDs, select them in advance. The class size, standard(s), expectations and fitness should be taken into account. And personal good practice matters, in classes and at social functions.

Sue used round the room exercises to mix partners and sets. She also showed how to build a dance by progressively introducing the next eight bars for each new couple. Good coaching identifies who does what, just in advance of the phrase. Step practice in groups is more welcoming for newcomers.

The afternoon began by looking at high and low impact dancing, and how teachers can adjust steps and formations to accommodate dancers at all levels. But Sue did remind us that this is not to be the norm for all dancers! We tried high and low impact dance styles and I certainly appreciated the difference in effort required.

Sue then discussed helping new dancers prepare for their first dance, covering dress code for various types of dances and etiquette of the dance. Recaps should be succinct and it is helpful to finish with a quick reminder of the first eight bars.

Many dancers are encouraged by participating in the various SCD courses and tests, and Sue brought us up to date on recent changes to course requirements.

It was an informative and enjoyable day. We all want to get the best from our classes, and Sue and Barbara certainly got the most from us. With discussions, a good choice of dances and practical dancing, I'm sure we all went home with ideas for classes at every level

Our thanks to Sue, and to Barbara, who provided excellent music. Thanks also to the Berkhamsted group for arranging the hall and providing tea, coffee and excellent cakes.

The next workshop is on 22 March in Wallington, led by Jimmie Hill. He will be exploring the history of Scottish country dancing.



LIVES REMEMBERED

John Laurie 20 May 1933 – 19 September 2014



It was with great sadness that the news was received in September that Branch Vice-President John Laurie had died suddenly whilst on holiday in Scotland. For 60 years he had been synonymous with Scottish country dancing at St Columba's, Pont Street, London. Over the same period he was also central to the running and atmosphere of St Columba's Church, where he acted as beadle and was an Elder, much involved with the senior church figures. This included attending on the Moderators on their annual visits, and as senior Elder he was presented to the Queen on her visit in 1983. In both St Columba's guises, he was typically the first person to greet newcomers and old friends alike, creating a wonderfully warm welcome for everyone.

John was born and educated in Perthshire, attending Lochearnhead Primary School and then McLaren High School in Callander. There he developed his love of Gilbert and Sullivan, and first recited at Burns' suppers, something he would continue to do to great acclaim for the rest of his life.

After national service with the RAF, John moved to London in 1954 to work for the Civil Service, in the personnel department with the Stationery Office. He immediately became involved with St Columba's Church of Scotland, including the Monday night socials held there. He became the regular MC in late 1960s, overseeing the dancing, compiling the dance programmes and, most importantly, selecting the music. John was passionate about SCD music. He had an encyclopaedic knowledge of tunes and recordings, which he happily shared with his many friends, and knew many band leaders and other musicians north and south of the border. His enthusiasm for tunes was often expressed with a jubilant "whoop" when the band changed tunes!

John supported the other dance groups that met at St Columba's, and he joined the London Branch Committee. For many years he ran our monthly dances, writing the programmes and MC'ing at many of them, and acted as convenor of the Dances Subcommittee. He served as Chairman from 1981 to 1984, and in 1998 he was appointed Vice President. For over thirteen years John edited *The Reel*, our longest-serving editor, and he continued to contribute music reviews up until his untimely death. He awarded the accolade "sheer magic" to the recordings that particularly impressed him. He also represented the Branch on the RSCDS Executive Council and was elected to the Publications Committee. He was delighted when his dance *Fraser's Favourite* was published by the Society in 1976, having been personally endorsed by Miss Milligan herself. Robbie Shepherd recognised John's contribution to Scottish country dancing and

music in a tribute on BBC Radio Scotland's Take the Floor programme on the announcement of his death.

Although he retired from running the Monday night dances in 2003, John remained the heart and soul of dancing at St Columba's. Generations of dancers will recall the friendly welcome they received from John whenever they arrived at a dance. He took a real interest in people, not just as dancers but as individuals, and he cared about them deeply. He had an amazing facility for remembering names, and he addressed many of his friends by the nicknames he had given them. I am flattered that having known him for almost forty years he still referred to me as "Young Kellett".

It is testament to the affection and respect in which he was held that so many dancers and musicians attended his funeral in Killin, Perthshire and the memorial service at St Columba's. Michael Stevenson, the Session Clerk, commented in his eulogy that "John never forgot his Scottish roots. He always loved his native Perthshire, and Iona in particular. He was returning from Perthshire when he died. He would visit Scotland several times a year to see his family – his surviving brother and two sisters. He had 13 nieces and nephews, and 30 great- and great-great-nieces and -nephews." To them, dancers may be surprised to know, he was known as Jake.

There will be another opportunity for us to remember John at the Combined Societies Dance on 25 April 2015, which is being dedicated to him. John will be missed greatly. He was a real enthusiast for Scottish country dancing and its music, and, more importantly, he was a true friend to so many of us.

Raymond West 26 September 1928 – 8 October 2014

Raymond West, an only child, was born in Raynes Park, SW20. During the war, his father's employment, as a government inspector of military and RAF uniforms and equipment, meant the family moved frequently. After a short period of conscription, and a series of boring jobs, Ray discovered an escape route – climbing – and he was away to the hills and mountains in the UK and Switzerland! After a tough day's trekking, mountaineering clubs frequently indulged in vigorous Scottish country dancing, as further evening sport. You had to be super-fit!

This was a new, fun challenge for all, where you did not have to be technically perfect, but, on acquiring a working knowledge of a few dances, you could birl the ladies and have an enjoyable evening. Never one to worry about the exactitudes of style, he just loved SCD for the jollity of the music, the fun and the comradeship of fellow dancers. All that we hope SCD to be!

Ray was one of the last people to go to Fetter Lane, and he danced at Pont St since the 1960s. He saw so many people come and go. He also joined other groups of dancers for weekends dancing in other cities in Europe and Russia

In the last few years, the chronic deteriorating conditions of arthritis and Parkinson's had left him marooned helplessly in a care home. For one so active and full of ingenuity, it was a demoralising, tragic situation.

Ray loved coming to Pont St, and is sadly missed, but we will remember him happily dancing his favourites – *The Irish Rover* and "*Ian Powrie*".

An Appreciation of Bobby Crowe and John Laurie

Dear Jeremy,

I wanted to write to share my very positive memories of both Bobby Crowe and John Laurie.

I knew Bobby much less well, but he was a big influence on my early playing days. He came to play with his band in Manchester very regularly in the 1980s. They were great nights in the Stockport Town Hall with a sell-out crowd of 300 dancers. The Band included the likes of Angus Fitchet and Ron Kerr on fiddle, Muriel Johnstone on piano and Malcolm Ross on drums. The style, accuracy and danceable nature of Bobby's music made it an absolute pleasure for both dancer and listener alike. He was, of course, also a regular contributor at the Younger Hall in St Andrews during the RSCDS Summer Schools over a long period.

Even though I loved to dance, I would also watch keenly to absorb Bobby's tremendous control of his instrument, particularly the lovely fluid left-hand technique he had. But my abiding memory of Bobby was his interest in young folk (as I was then), and his generosity of spirit, both in talking about the music, and in sharing his immense collection of tunes and arrangements. Much of my early band music is based on sheets that Bobby willingly gave away.

I first met John Laurie in the late 1980s at a wedding in Belgium. It was the start of a long friendship based on a common interest in Scottish dancing and music, and hymn tunes too!

John had an encyclopaedic knowledge of Scottish dance tunes, though I like to think I occasionally gave him a run for his money. He was always interested in the people too, and it was most fitting that this aspect of his character came out so strongly at his funeral. He certainly gave me and my fledgling band every encouragement, including sponsoring and being the driving force behind the Band's early recordings. I am so very grateful for that support.

In London, he was definitely the face of Scottish country dancing at St Columba's Church. He masterminded the Monday night dancing for several decades, and was very often MCing or on the door at so many other dancing nights. John was the guy that was always networking, connecting people and generally providing the welcoming glue for the large ensemble of dancers that would pass through the Pont Street doors. Somehow, dancing at Pont Street won't seem quite the same without John there: the welcome, the keeping up with what tunes the band are playing, appreciating the different qualities that each band brings, and being introduced to yet another new and interesting person with whom there is a connection you'd never have discovered without John.

Bobby Crowe 1 February 1933 – 17 September 2014

There are very few Scottish dance band leaders who dedicated as much time and contributed so much to the Scottish country dance scene as Bobby Crowe. Hailing from Balmullo, in Fife, Bobby was involved in the Scottish dance band scene from the early fifties. He was a renowned accordionist and band leader, who not only led his own top class band, but was also the accordion sound of The Olympians, The Cameron Kerr Band, Angus Fitchet's Band and the New Cavendish Band. His own band, formed in 1955, was one of the best known in its time, very popular and in great demand in Scottish country dance circles north and south of the border. His first band broadcast was in 1961, he recorded eleven LPs for the RSCDS, released three commercial recordings and played for the Queen at Balmoral and Holyrood.

The Bobby Crowe Band had a truly great sound and was one of the best bands to dance to. He understood the need to have the tempo just right, the tunes were carefully selected to suit each dance and the playing was superb.



Bobby has been greatly missed from the broadcasting and Scottish dance scene, but, even after his playing career was prematurely ended in the early nineties, he maintained a keen interest in the music, and was a well-known figure, travelling the country to listen to the music, chat with fellow enthusiasts and promote the quality approach to traditional music he loved. Indeed, he was doing just that at Perth Accordion Club the night before he passed away. Several generations of young musicians have benefited from his encouragement and he was always prepared to do what he could to help youngsters achieve their potential.

My introduction to Bobby came about on the stage at Younger Hall during Summer School in the 1970s. I had just played for a ladies' step demonstration when an agitated Mr Crowe suddenly asked me, "Do you read the dots?" Not really knowing what he meant, I shrugged and mumbled something about giving it a go, whereupon I was directed to the piano, and was launched into playing for the next dance on the programme. I had never played in a band; the "dots" were actually a chord chart (really?!) and I was terrified! I remember some hideous moments when I got the chord symbols back to front, and was producing some chords that definitely didn't quite fit! Bobby must have been hoping that his pianist would return from the pub in time for the next dance, but he failed to appear. I managed to get through the evening somehow – and was hooked!

Even more surprisingly, I was booked for another gig, and subsequently was privileged to have seven years playing in Bobby's band. I learned a huge amount about the music, the harmony, tempo, rhythm and lift, playing in a band, the repertoire, putting sets together and how to write the band parts (all done by hand in those days). Many of us musicians have in our possession some cherished arrangements in Bobby's distinctive hand – bold and black, clear and correct. He also spent hours searching through books and old manuscripts to find good tunes. To my mind he was the best executant of fiddle strathspeys on the accordion. I always remember him saying, "There's more to being a band leader than strapping on a box".

On long journeys Bobby entertained us with stories from the old days and anecdotes about various legendary figures: Jimmy Shand, Angus Fitchet, Ian Powrie, Jimmy Blue and a host of others including producers at the BBC and characters in dancing circles; no-one was safe!

In addition to his informed insights into the music scene Bobby had a unique sense of humour. Some of his funny sayings spring to mind such as "long may yer lum hat" and "it's only one of his legs that's not the same length as the other". To say that Bobby was a character is an understatement! He had a great zest for life and tended not to do things by half...

Jim Lindsay remembers: "In the early days, when on a long journey in the old transit van, he would have a reel to reel tape recorder rigged up to the band speakers playing at full volume, and optics for the whisky attached to the side of the van – it was jumping!"

There is a story about him going to a big British accordion festival in Blackpool a few years back, long after he had stopped playing. He had an accordion case with him and everyone was surprised, assuming he had started playing again. But the first acquaintance he met in the foyer was treated to the case being opened to reveal a cocktail cabinet complete with various spirits, glasses, water etc., and throughout the weekend he would set up the bar wherever he happened to be!

Bobby certainly entered into the spirit of things, but nowhere more than in his love of music, which extended far beyond Scottish dance music. A highly respected musician and band leader, a master joiner, a devoted family man and a great friend of many, Bobby will be missed.

As he himself would have said in parting, "See ye a while ago!"

John Laurie on Bobby Crowe

John Laurie's contributions to the Record Review corner of The Reel stretch back over 40 years, both before and after he was Editor. He always brought his vast knowledge to bear to the benefit of the reader, and wasn't afraid to state his views firmly. Of the many reviews he wrote, many demonstrate these attributes and warrant reproduction, but it seemed appropriate to pick one that featured Bobby Crowe's Band. It dates from The Reel 145, dated August 1978. Sadly the recording has never been re-released, although some of the tracks are available on RSCDS compilation CDs, including one entitled A Fife Fairing (now out of stock at HQ).

Four RSCDS Dances for 1978, etc.: Exactly seven years ago we reviewed nine records and said "Top of the Pops in this lot is undoubtedly Bobby Crowe" and went on to say "you will want to listen to over and over again." Seven years on...buy this new record and you will want to listen over and over again. It really is excellent. Tempo is just right on each and every track. For reasons best known to the Society its records do not contain any of the good modern tunes composed by contemporary band leaders, but if you were disappointed with the quite dreary selection of tunes on the record for Book 28 have no fears on this latest record. There are in fact hundreds of good traditional tunes and those chosen on this occasion are, without exception, good ones. We immediately recognise no fewer than six strathspeys by J. Scott Skinner. (We suspect there are one or two new compositions among the originals and do wish the Society (our Society!) would take the trouble to give us the sources of tunes.) Assisting Bobby, we have James Lindsay playing exceedingly competently on second accordion (not to be confused with Jimmy Lindsay who made the Book 28 record), Angus Fitchet on fiddle – the sleeve says violin – Peter Straughan on piano, Dave Barclay on bass and Colin Lander on drums. Sound engineer is Stuart Jeffrey, which means the recording was done in Bryce Laing's Craighall studio in Edinburgh and this means first-rate recording quality. (Did you know that Craighall's reputation is such that EMI Records brings them, with their mobile studio, all the way to Earl's Court to record the Royal Tournament?). This record is very good value with about 50 minutes' playing time. It will surely appeal to dancers and to listeners alike.

Partners for The Eightsome Reel

I was recently faced with an interesting decision—without a live musician, which recording of *The Eightsome Reel* should I choose for a dance evening? Most dances have been recorded at least once; this one perhaps more than any other. The adventurous can find dozens to choose from on iTunes, ranging from a hasty 7'03" version from The Reel Thing, to a Jim Macleod the slowest, at 8'54"

I decided to do something of a test across the recordings I own, to decide which I felt was most suitable for my purposes. In doing so I compared a number of factors:

- Tempo without access to adjustment technology I needed something that would work as it was;
- Tunes a great variety is available, with no clear original. The Society has settled on the Deil amang the Tailors, though this is one occasion when this seems less relevant. Traditional fiddle reels such as Soldier's Joy, The Fairy Dance and Kate Dalrymple are most common to make up the sets (some noted originals for other RSCDS dances);
- Layout of tunes how well the tunes are structured to make up the 464 bars, or more particularly, 40 at the start and finish and 8x48 in between, and therefore to fit the dance;
- Sound I needed something I could project into a hall without it sounding terrible, but was also looking for some variety across the long dance.

I found I had seven recordings, covering a range of popular bands and spread over quite a number of years.

The Jim Macleod recording I have is the oldest, and, at 8'00", one of the quickest of those I am considering. It suffers from poor sound, which from the first chord is a challenge - this wouldn't come across well if amplified in a hall. The stereo is rather accentuated, with drums in one corner, bass and piano in another, and fiddle and accordion in the centre. It's great to hear the work of Jim Macleod adding his characteristic flavour on the piano, but the drums are rather prominent, with frequent and insistent cross rhythms. He takes *The Marquess of Tulliebardine* as the original, followed by 'standards' from the Jim Macleod band book, each with flavour, though quite straight in presentation (more 'herb' than 'spice'). The lead into the final tune (Kate Dalrymple) seems a little half-hearted, amid a set that overall feels rather frenetic.

Iain MacPhail clocks the same time on his live recording from South America. His tunes follow the fiddle reel model, from *De'il amang the Tailors* to start, to *Kate Dalrymple* to finish. Ron Kerr's fiddle is to the fore, plus second box, giving a full sound across the band. The whole band (or "orchestra" as I sometimes heard it referred to) get

their moment in the spotlight, with syncopation, octave doubling of parts, and second parts etc. It's a typically thrilling approach.

Ron Kerr also features on Bobby Crowe's recording, possibly too prominently for some. It is similar to the MacPhail in its use of traditional tunes, starting and finishing with High Road to Linton, and the spread of rhythmic, harmonic and melodic interest across the full band. Bobby insisted on playing the middle, verse sections as 2x24 bars (ABBABB) for each dancer, fitting the dance better than the more common AABBAB. something I particular enjoy. He also switches to a minor key tune (The Drummer) to point up the start of the men's section in the middle, complete with piano solo and wood-blocks. A slight curiosity is that he used five tunes for the middle section, so three are re-used. As with all of Bobby's playing its focus is on supporting the dance whilst maintaining the listener's interest. The tempo feels just right at 8'11" for the whole

Against high expectations, as a big fan of the band, I found Colin Dewar's recording for the Collins book disappointing. The three-piece band doesn't give a full sound, or the options of more interesting arrangements. Whilst the playing is as classy as I expected, at 8'30" it is a little on the slow side, and the choice of tunes – song and march style rather than fiddle reels – makes for a less exciting mix. The return to the *Deil amang the Tailors* for the final chorus comes as a bit of a change of gear, a sign for me of less well-matched alternatives

Neil Barron's RSCDS recording is punchy and dramatic from the outset, but I felt did not sustain that through the whole set. There is a solid sound across the band, and some neat moments, including a particularly pleasing key change in the middle of *High Road to Linton* as tune 6. Unlike others, there is no key change or dramatic return to

amang the Tailors for the final chorus. At 8'36" it is even a touch slower than Colin Dewar.

A more

recent recording comes from Jim Lindsay, pianist on the Bobby Crowe CD. He follows Bobby's lead in the layout of traditional tunes to support the dancers in the middle section (ABBABB), heightened by the use of wood-block for the second 8 of each 48, though some may find this a little repetitive. Again, like Bobby Crowe, he uses a minor key tune, *The Ale is Dear*, for first man. He also distributes six tunes across the eight dancers, so two tunes are repeated for third and fourth men, something I found slightly distracting. Tempo is just right (8'13" in total), and it's a great addition to the options.

The final option I had is Luke Brady's recording from the 2014 RSCDS Commonwealth Ceilidh download. His verse sections use four tunes, each laid out in a different way, including *The Black Bear* (ABAABA) and *High Road to Linton* (ABCABB). The playing style differs from the other bands, with quavers played more evenly, but it's a great sound and offers a good modern option.

In the end, it's Bobby Crowe's recording I return to. I can use the objective criteria I set above, variety, tempo, matching of the tunes to the dance, band sound etc. to justify my final choice, but memories play a part: as well as dancing to Bobby Crowe in Manchester, London and St Andrews, when this particular CD was released, Bobby and the band played in Maidenhead for a ball. Naturally the band joined an after-dance party, and we danced into the night, including the band members. When it came to The Eightsome Reel track, Edward Galley, the second box player, was persuaded to dance. Falling over part way through, he was surprised to find that we carried on dancing round him; he had no choice but to get up and carry on! So, my choice is based on a combination of structural, musical and social factors - the essence of dance, in fact. You may consider the same factors and reach an entirely reasonable, but different conclusion.

Among other items we sell London Branch badges, one with a thistle and the words 'RSCDS

London since 1930', and one in white, gold and black with a lion rampant.

I invite you to look on the website for details of what is available, or contact me if you cannot access the website or have any queries. The bookstall will be on a smaller scale than in the past, as the Internet has reduced demand for printed books and CDs; but I aim to continue to provide a useful service to Branch members and others.


Craigievar's CD covers a range of traditional tunes for well-known dances, most of them ceilidh dances. It features three members of the Forbes family: Alastair, Stuart and Alex; four if you count Alastair's second box playing in addition. The fiddle and accordion provide a strong lead, with a well-balanced piano in support, and the addition of second accordion makes



for a balanced sound, though it might be considered less suitable for use at a ceilidh due to the lack of drums. I particularly enjoyed the *Fairyland Waltz* by Charles Warren, used for the *St Bernard's Waltz*. The CD shows off the band to good effect, and several of the unusual track lengths may prove useful, for example a four times through *Mairi's Wedding Encore*.

On their latest CD, Jim and Muriel, both erstwhile key members of Bobby Crowe's Band (see p9 and article opposite), with Keith Smith on

fiddle for several tracks, form a true chamber group, equal partners throughout. Muriel's extraordinary originality and productivity is in evidence, not just in composition, with 35 of her tunes across the 14 dances, many of them new, but also in the interpretation: throughout the recording the music is enlivened by counter-melodies, doubling on the piano, light and shade within tunes, and delightful harmonies, all backed by the fundamental security of rhythm that is a hallmark of Muriel's playing. The playing is really beautiful, and I particularly enjoyed the lilt of the jigs. There's a really slick cascade of triplets in a version of Scott Skinner's *Dr Gordon Stables' Reel* in the set for *The Pawling Porch/A Double Measure*. The most valid comparison would be with Muriel's early *Dancing Fingers* recordings, except here with accordion (and in some cases fiddle) substituting for one of the multi-tracked piano parts on those iconic

The dances are taken from *Moments in Time*, a collection of dances by Elaine Brunken. Born in Falkland, Elaine has been in the US for over 35 years, and the dances have been written over the last 14 years for a variety of friends in a great variety of places. Several of the dances contain unusual variations on movements, for example mirror reels of four, but there are also easier dances that may be useful for teaching purposes. One thing to note: the 14 tracks are representing 21 dances, so seven of them double up for two dances, with both originals played within the set.

Marian Anderson's second CD to accompany dances originating from Western Australia also features Keith Smith on fiddle, but within the context of a full, modern, accordion band sound, alongside Marian and Graham Bell on accordions, Isobelle Hodgson on piano (and bass) and Max Ketchin on drums. It's well-balanced to hear all the instruments (something I have not always found to be the case when heard live).

Of the dances recorded, *Christine M Phillips* and *High Society* were both in RSCDS Book 46, and two others were in the book *Scottish Country Dances for Perth 800*. The instructions for the other dances are included in the insert booklet of the CD, or else are available to download free of charge, along with the original tunes.

Marian's band display all the characteristics we have come to expect, with lots of variety of style and use of cross-rhythms, syncopation and harmonic flavour to liven up the material. Many of the dances feature her own original tunes, and she matches these throughout with modern tunes, many also of her own devising, but also including some band favourites, such as Robert Mathieson's pipe reel *Itchy Fingers*, in a great set for *The Two Gray Cats*. I'm sorry that means we get no traditional tunes in the mix. There is a great pair of march tunes by John Burns to start the CD (with an associated walking ceilidh-style dance to go with them), and a most attractive cool-down waltz at the end.

Heads and Eyes Up

Dear Jeremy,

I've been dancing now for about 30 years, in and around those distant London suburbs of Cheshire, the North West and the West Midlands. I've been enjoying your magazine for a good many of those years, and particularly like the frankness of some of the articles and letters.

You cannot guess just how much I agree with Adrian Conrad's letter in *The Reel* 289, particularly his last paragraph. It becomes such a disappointment when, as happens, you have a dance with an excellent partner who has perfect footwork, faultless timing and a very clear knowledge of the dance, only to find that all you've really seen of her is the top of her head as she is so interested in the floor!

Have you ever watched the solemn faces in the line opposite during recaps, at dances and balls? Many look as though they are on death row rather than out to enjoy themselves!

I've found a good way of helping overcome those problems, and that is to continually supplement the "heads up" requests, often with a joke to get a smile, or comments like "check that there's a person on the other end of that hand you're holding", or "if you're talking to a friend do you look at them or at the floor?" It seems to be working well at my various groups – faces are so much nicer to look at than the top of people's heads, and, if you get eye contact too, then WOW, that really feels good!

As for the reviews of CDs, generally pretty good, honest and helpful, just what we want. BUT, I think there are a couple of words missing in John Laurie's review of RSCDS Book 48 CD. Those words are "very much". The recording isn't just "on the slow side", it is VERY MUCH on the slow side. If I played it as it stands at any of my groups and classes, I'd be inundated with adverse comments. Pity as the music is otherwise great, and a tribute to Susan MacFadyen and her Band. All I can say is, thank goodness for speed adjustment programmes — I use The Amazing Slow Downer, which can speed up or slow down in 1% increments without changing the pitch. (Other speed adjustment programmes are available!)

Anyway, keep up your great work with The Reel - it is by far my favourite Scottish dancing 'Read'.

Scottish Country Dancing in Malaysia? Reely?!

Jessie Behan recently passed through London and came to dance at Pont St, but most of the time she's dancing in a rather different atmosphere. We asked her to paint a picture of dancing in Malaysia.

"Isn't it too hot over there?", I hear you ask! No, no; we have highlands here too! "Well okay then,

but why on earth would people gather to do Scottish dancing in Malaysia of all places?" Well actually, there is a reason to dance The Flowers of Edinburgh by the South China Sea: the British first came to Malaysia in the 18th century, seeking to establish trading posts. When the jungle heat became too intense, they holidayed in hill stations created in the style of quaint British villages, taking afternoon tea, dancing and playing music. One of these hill stations, the Cameron Highlands, became the main producer of Malaysia's tea industry. And that all started when, in 1929, the first tea bush was planted by a Brit by the name of John Archibald Russell.

So, even if you hadn't imagined Malaysia as a place to petronella, you may be interested to know that there is a group in Kuala Lumpur who meet fortnightly to celebrate and enjoy this Scottish tradition. What is more, the octogenarian son of J.A. Russell, the tea pioneer whose family has lived in Malaysia ever since, continues to organise the practices to this day.

The group meet within sight of the iconic Petronas Twin Towers and welcome people of any ability. Most dance practices attract a crowd large enough to form two or three sets, and include a dedicated following. Expats and Malaysians alike are attracted by

the jovial, collective nature of the dance, and attendees represent at least ten nationalities, reflecting the cosmopolitan nature of the city. A couple of experienced dancers (real Scots!) patiently call, and occasionally prepare the group for performances at events organised by the St Andrew's Society of Kuala Lumpur. Additionally, definite highlights on the calendar are the trips up to the Cameron Highlands; hosted by the original tea estate, when the group spends the weekend 'speeding the plough' amongst the lush tea plantations' cool mountain air.






