A Jig for Charlie


48 bar Jig: 3 couples

Music: Don't go below F


1-4 1st couple cross over giving right hands and cast off one place, 2nd couple step up.

5-8 1st couple cross over giving left hands and woman casts up while man casts down. Figure 1.


9-12 1st woman holding nearer hands with 2nd man dances clockwise round him as he sets, turning on the spot; while 1st man does the same with 3rd woman. Figure 2.




13-16 1st woman holding nearer hands with 2nd woman dances anti-clockwise round her as she sets, turning on the spot; while 1st man does the same with 3rd man. Figure 3.



17-24 1st couple pass left shoulders in the middle and repeat bars 9-16; 1st woman dancing with 3rd man then 3rd woman; 1st man with 2nd woman then 2nd man. Figures 4 & 5. 1st couple finish in 2nd place.



25-28 1st couple with 2 pas de basque advance and $\frac{1}{2}$ turn with both hands joined and dance 4 slip steps down middle to 3rd place. Figure 6.

Meanwhile, 2nd and 3rd couples dance $\frac{1}{2}$ rights and left omitting polite turn to finish with 2nd couple in 2nd place on the side.

29-32 1st couple dance a $\frac{1}{2}$ turn with both hands joined and retire to 3rd place on own side (4 pas de basque) while 3rd and 2nd couples continue dancing right and left.

Repeat twice more.
