Her enthusiasm and dedication has taken her all over the UK as well as to parts of Europe and the USA.

We greatly appreciate Jenny's many years of service to the Branch and realise the loss her departure will be to the London area in general and the Branch in particular. I am sure, though, that we shall still see her from time to time, as she has many friends in the Southeast. Perthshire is a lovely county with many wonderful golf courses, which I am sure she is waiting to sample.

May I, on behalf of the Branch, wish her a very happy life in Scotland.

Having danced since I was three years old, mainly ballet and national dance, Scottish Country Dancing seemed a good idea. That was over 40 years ago in 1961 when I started my teaching career in Wallington.

The classes were run by the Wallington and Carshalton Scottish Association and taught by Andrew Grant. There were classes for beginners and advanced levels as well as a demonstration group. Andrew was a very thorough teacher and demanded high standards like someone else I got to know very well! I soon became very involved with the group and made many friends. We were all young in those days, and danced regularly on Friday and Saturday evenings at Fetter Lane, the Royal Scottish Corporation Hall. There were also dances at Amersham and Harrow with a number of different bands - Stan Watts, Flora Argent, Bobby Morton (Blue Bonnets) and, of course McBains' with Nan Fleming-Williams, Davie Thornton, Bill Farr, Alan Humberstone and Jack Farr (no relation to Bill). A group of us also formed a team - the Lads and Lasses - which competed in the Highland Games held on Clapham Common, then at Richmond. Athletic ground, and also at the Harpenden Gathering. We were quite successful!

In the early sixties I joined the London Branch of the RSCDS and attended classes taken

by Innes Russell and Bill Hamilton. After a couple of years a friend and I thought we would audition for the demonstration class. We were told that we had to be "awfully good" to be accepted, but we were, so we must have been! Bill Ireland took the class — say no more. We worked hard, but had a lot of fun. I also remember the various musicians who played for



the class – Ivy Hayes, Gert Stewart and Joan Gilbert, and the pipers who played for the demonstrations – Bob Hill, Roger Huth, Sandy Reid and Charlie Galloway. Highlights of my time in the class were the EFDSS Folk Festivals at the Royal Albert Hall, trips abroad to France (Saumur) and Poland and concerts given at several different venues, master-minded by Bill.

Annual dances held at Seymour Hall and Porchester Hall and run by the RSCDS, the Reel Club and Highland Club were highlights of the dancing year, with bands from Scotland – Jimmy Shand, Ian Powrie and Jim McLeod to name but three. The other great occasion was the Branch Ball held at the Hyde Park Hotel, then Quaglino's in Piccadilly. All these dances were well attended: there was usually a waiting list for tickets! Other memorable events were the Anglo-Scottish dances held at Cecil Sharp House and Weekend Schools at Bisham Abbey. I shall always remember Marie Jamieson putting Alka-Seltzer into a mug of hot chocolate!

CONSULTATION: LONDON BRANCH RESPONSE

Should the Society be Branch-based or Member-based?

The Committee would like to thank all who responded. Your views have been passed to HQ.

A large majority of those who expressed a view favoured the Society continuing to be branch-based. Only one of the written responses was for a member-based option. When the question was discussed by the London Branch Committee, all but one of the fifteen members supported the branch-based alternative.

Reasons given for the Society being branchbased were:

- As Jimmie Hill writes, most dancers feel loyalty to their Branch, and their dancing life revolves round that rather than headquarters.
- There seems to be very little knowledge or (sadly) interest in the affairs of headquarters.
 So if one-member-one vote (omov) were to be introduced, few members would have the relevant knowledge necessary to be able to cast an informed vote on Society matters, and most would not bother.
- Under omov too much power would be concentrated in HQ, as they would control the flow of information to members. As Jimmie Hill points out, there is a risk of a pressure group dominating and causing changes which the majority would not welcome but might not discover or act in time to prevent.
- Omov was thought to be expensive and necessitate a large increase in subscriptions. Many London members are living on fixed incomes and would not want this. Moreover, as membership is falling while subscriptions are unchanged, it is reasonable to expect that a big increase in subscription would lead to an accelerated decline in membership. As many of the Society's costs are fixed irrespective of the number of members, there is a real risk of starting a spiral of rising subscriptions and falling membership, which would leave the Society much smaller.
- There is a danger a member-based constitution would politicise members (another of Jimmie Hill's points). Conscientious members would spend time considering and voting on every issue and election which now goes before an AGM. Energy would be used for Society politics which would be better spent on dancing or encouraging others to dance.
- · Introducing omov would lead to a sharp drop in the quality of the Society's decision making. Branch delegates at an AGM make better decisions than would most individual members. Branch delegates have been chosen to represent the Branch, are well placed to consult within their Branch and with other Branches, often understand the management of the Society from having been involved in running their Branch, and have the chance to listen to the debate at the AGM. Individual members would often have little chance of well-informed discussion of the issues, at an AGM or elsewhere, or of receiving advice other than from the powers that be in the Society.

On HQ members, many are puzzled why they pay through the nose for HQ membership when they can join a Branch such as London and get better service for lower cost! One proposal was that HQ members in Great Britain should form a Branch, and those living overseas should form another Branch. Another suggestion was that those who choose not to join a Branch should be able to subscribe to Society publications but should not be regarded as members.

However only about two percent of London

Branch members responded in any way. It seems reasonable to deduce that the bulk of London members are content with existing arrangements and there is very little call for radical change. While some of us found it useful to reconsider the nature of the Society, the message from London Branch for the Management Board is that they should now devote their time and energy to other matters. As one member wrote, 'there are real challenges facing the Society, but this issue is not one of them'.

MANAGEMENT BOARD REPORT

14th February and 3rd April 2004

The Society's Management Board has met twice since Rachel reported about its work in the previous issue of *The Reel*. The main topic under consideration has been whether Branch delegates or individual members should vote at the Society AGM. *The Reel* has given commendably full coverage to the arguments on each side of the debate, and Headquarters received 44 submissions from Branches and 127 submissions from individual members. Although these comments were not binding, a number of Board members changed their stance as a result of this

from individual members. Although these comments were not binding, a number of Board members changed their stance as a result of this consultative exercise. The upshot was that the Board decided to retain the Branch delegate system, while recognising that much could be done to improve the way it operates and that one member one vote might still be introduced some time in the future (though I personally hope that we will not reopen the debate for at least a few

years).

One area where the Board is committed to seeking an improvement is in the quality of communication with members, thus helping members make better informed decisions locally when they select and task their delegates. The Board has therefore set in motion processes that will lead to the publication of a members' magazine at least twice a year to be sent direct from Headquarters to each member. In due course this magazine will replace the Bulletin and the Newsbrief. Another change concerns the position of Headquarters members who, under the Branch delegate system, do not have a voice at the AGM. The Board will therefore allow the formation of an International Branch to represent the interests of Headquarters members who choose to join it. More decisions need to be taken in relation to the magazine and the International Branch, but in facilitating both the Management Board has shown that it can act with relative decisiveness and speed compared to the former Executive Council

The magazine is part of a wider publications policy that the Board is considering. This includes the future of an annual book for members containing (mostly) new dances with music. Also under consideration is a new structure for teachers' examinations based on five units (written paper, practical dancing, two teaching tests and a record of practical teaching), the idea being that unsuccessful candidates would only be required to re-take the unit(s) they failed if they wished to re-sit the examination. A draft structure has been sent to Branches for comment. On a related theme, the Society needs to appoint some new examiners and a selection panel is being set up.

The medal tests for junior dancers and a Branch Award, for outstanding service at a local level, will be launched later this year. A marketing group is looking at ways of recruiting new members. One idea is to take advantage of the UNESCO Day of Dance on Friday 29th April 2005. Hopefully the revised Manual will be available at Summer School. Building work to improve the facilities at Headquarters is progressing, but slowly. The Society's AGM in November 2004 has been moved to Perth from Edinburgh, where we were let down over accommodation. This year the AGM will be part of a broader Conference Weekend, including dances, classes, Branch Convention, open forum and Sunday morning seminars. Work continues on improving the Society's web page www. rscds.org, where more information about the RSCDS and its activities can be found.

KEN STOTT'S CELEBRATION DANCE



On 7th February 2004 Ken Stott, a member of the RSCDS London Branch since 1963, and a member of the South East Essex Scottish Society and the Leigh Caledonian Dancers, celebrated his 90th Birthday by holding a special Scottish Country Dance.

Ken devised the programme of twenty of his favourite dances, hired the Rayleigh Grange Hall, persuaded Jim English and the Rowans to come out of semi-retirement to provide the music, and Bob Dobney to play the bagpipes. The two Essex societies, where Ken is still an active dancer, provided the buffet for more than 120 dancers, and guests, who attended the birthday celebration.

Although Ken did Scottish Country Dancing when he lived for some years in Gourock, he did not get seriously involved until he answered an advert in a local paper to join a group called the Allen Dancers at Southend, in 1963. They were taught by a lady from Romford called Stella Shank, who encouraged him to join the London Branch of the RSCDS. In September the following year he joined the South East Essex Scottish Society's Reel Club.

Ken attended teachers classes, organised by RSCDS London Branch in the late 1960's. The class teacher was Frances Stamp. He attended many classes in London, and has been taught by many well known dance teachers including Bill Ireland, Mary Stoker and Alex Westwood. Ken

successfully passed his intermediate certificate in 1971, and the full teaching certificate for Scottish Country Dancing in 1972, both passed at the first attempt.

Between 1973 and 1976 he ran a children's class at St. George's church hall in Southend, and has been President of the South East Essex Scottish Society on two occasions, first in 1976-77, and again in 1987-88.

Ken's Birthday celebration was a big success. He danced every dance on the programme, including the encores. There were dancers there from eight of the Essex Scottish Societies/Associations – Basildon, Chelmsford, Clacton, Leigh, Rayleigh, South East Essex, Upminster and Witham. Good wishes were received from Colchester, Epping, Harlow and Ilford. Eight members of Ken's family also attended, including his daughter and her husband from Nevada, USA, and his two sons and their families.

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

15 DAYS ON THE BURNS CIRCUIT

Readers may be interested in a dem team with a rather different style to our own. This is from the Newsletter of RSCDS Toronto Association, with thanks.

In common with many social groups within RSCDS Toronto, the Petronella Scottish Country Dancers of Thornhill have long had a demonstration team, available to meet the needs of the community within York Region. Petronella dancers have worked hard over the years under the leadership of veteran teacher, Janette Todd, to be able to demonstrate the joys of Scottish Country Dancing to audiences at festivals and village fairs, in seniors' residences, and at other locations throughout the Region.

Since the Petronella team concluded not so long ago a run of eight performances at Burns' Suppers between January 17 and February 1, it seemed appropriate to use this recent experience as the basis for this article, especially now that the team's emcee (yours truly) has recovered from the resulting exhaustion.

Petronella has long had a core of established dances for demo purposes, focusing on four-couple dances like Let's Have a Ceilidh, Blooms of Bon Accord, and The Robertson Rant for maximum impact on an audience: i.e. no dancers are standing around for 32 bars. For similar reasons, Black Mountain Reel, a five-couple dance, is also worthy of consideration. When we do three-couple dances in a four-couple set, we

most often dance them "once and to the bottom", ensuring of course, a carefully prepared smooth exit to fourth place by the dancing couple. This avoids boring our audience with a full 256 bars of seemingly endless repetition. Even that most elegant and popular Strathspey, Bonnie Stronshiray, can seem to go on forever if danced to the full, running the risk of having a soporific effect on the audience. Having two inventive teachers (past and present), one might ask why we don't devise our own original dances. This is fine so long as you do not need to bring in guest dancers at short notice when you have a multi-event schedule. This I've certainly had to do, with guest participation by experienced dancers from other Groups.

Petronella demo performances, Burns' Suppers or otherwise, do not rely on Scottish Country Dancing exclusively. We try to vary our overall presentation by including Highland Dancers, preferably youngsters because we are fortunate to have Ella Allison, a Highland Dance teacher, within our ranks. We can also take advantage of the adult Highland Dancing talents of Donald Holmes and our own Carole Skinner for this purpose, For Burns' Suppers, we offer not only to secure a piper, but also to have our very own gregarious Glaswegian, Donald Homer, to "address the haggis". Donald is a great addition to the program, being a Burns aficionado. His recitations of other examples of the Bard's poetry, such as "Ode to a Mouse" or "Ode to a Toothache" always go over very well with our audiences. And I am working on the regular inclusion of a singer in our shows. "My Love Is Like A Red, Red Rose" or even "Westering Home", would be popular in such situations.

Me. I get to MC these events. I try to maintain a stream of banter to keep the program light. Wherever possible, I tell a brief story about each dance to bring it to life. (I trust all readers know where/what Stronshiray is!) One can also have fun introducing the dancers to the audience. On a recent occasion they all happened to be from Glasgow except one solitary Dundonian. As the Petronella MC, I am of course betrayed by my English accent, (happening to hail from Derby.... very significant in the annals of Scotland back in 1745). These situations provide opportunity to bring humour into the event. Petronella really tries to execute, not exclusively a Scottish Country Dance demonstration, but a Scottish variety show.

Things do not always go according to plan. On a really foul night a few weeks ago, we commenced our performance with a set that comprised only three women, but five men. Who says men can't dance the woman's role? We had no other choice. (Thank you, David Wilson!) Even the haggis can present the odd problem. At Thornhill Presbyterian Church, the catering staff laid a six pound haggis on the hod which was still frozen solid. Donald Homer had to struggle to get his knife into it ("An cut you up wi' ready sleight, trenchin' your gushing entrails bright" being far from the reality of the occasion). This was cause of much hilarity among the audience. And from the sublime to the ridiculous, at one long term care residence, the haggis had been boiled to death, turning it into a stew. We had it drained, dried out and re-wrapped in Saran Wrap™. When offered in small portions to the audience, they lapped it up.

Petronella dancers spice up performances with a lot of joy and laughter, because we think it is important for the audience to recognize what fun Scottish Country Dancing is. Most of the time, audiences will hardly notice slip-ups in performance, and as Janette always told us, "Just keep on dancing!". If the dancers show that they are having a whale of a fun time performing, success is virtually inevitable.

Overall, it is my view that a relaxed, light-hearted performance, replete with beaming smiles and chuckles, will trump perfection any day of the week.

NEW LIGHT ON HUGH FOSS

A recent book, *The Emperor's Codes* by Michael Smith, reveals sides of Hugh Foss which his Scottish dancing friends did not see.

Hugh Foss (1902-1971) was President of RSCDS London Branch in the 1950s. He founded *The Reel* in 1951 and helped in its early development. A tribute to him by Andrew Kellett in *Reel* 200 in 1992 states that for obvious reasons he spoke little about his professional career and also revealed little about himself.

Michael Smith's book, based on material only recently released, reveals that Hugh Foss was a brilliant codebreaker who played a leading part in cracking Japanese secret ciphers before and during World War II. His first major success was in 1934 when he broke a new machine cipher used by Japanese naval attachés in their embassies. During the war he was Head of the Japanese section at Bletchley Park. He was sent to Washington in 1944 to help American codebreaking work.

It was at Bletchley Park that Alan Turing and others broke German codes using machines which were the forerunners of modern computers. Hugh Foss developed a device to read Japanese machine cipher: it was made in the office using a brown foolscap file cover with a collar stud, a piece of string and slots cut in the cover for the letters. But it worked, and from what we know of Hugh Foss he would not have been worried by its apparent lack of sophistication.

Hugh is described as an 'eccentric Scot'. In fact he was English, but his habit of wearing a kilt may well have given the wrong impression. That combined with his sandals, his straggly red beard and his height of 6ft 5in gave him a very distinctive appearance.

The book also sheds light on his domestic life, as described by his cousin Elizabeth Browning. His Scots wife Alison was said to be "a darling but almost totally incompetent domestically". So Hugh went home every day at 4.30 to put the children to bed, get supper and organise things. He had highly complicated arrangements for washing up. Every article had to be washed in a particular order. For example, saucers were washed first, as being least polluted by human lips. Two or three days' washing up was often stacked on the floor, and "the dogs were a great help". If anyone tried to help there would be shrieks of "Oh, you mustn't do the cups yet, saucers first"

There was also an arrangement that Hugh would put things away at places appropriate to his great height, while Alison, who was short and dumpy, had a smaller range. But (as in many households) not everything was always in its right place. Elizabeth Browning recalled having lunch there with Hugh's muddy boots on the table beside her to remind him they needed cleaning.

It is suggested Hugh was sent to Washington in 1944 to enable him to concentrate on codebreaking work without domestic distractions.

Life cannot have been dull when Hugh Foss was around.

Bobby Brown's Band is based in Canada and is a welcome addition to those playing for the Society. I find the strathspeys a bit on the heavy side but the reels and jigs are bright with a good lift. There is perhaps a missing ingredient in the mix – i.e. a fiddle.

The Muriel Johnstone Quartet has, of course, a strong emphasis on the fiddle with Keith Smith on that instrument. Jimmy Lindsay is on accordion and Gordon Smith on drums. As ever Muriel brings it all together with her excellent piano playing.

Now to the two CDs by the Duo. What a fantastic musical partnership they are! When I was in the late Bill Ireland's class he used to say "DOWN – 2 3 4" when we were practising in strathspey time. He also used to demonstrate how far one could dance down the hall to four bars of good music in reel or jig time. I can still hear his voice – "Lift and travel... Lift and travel." Well we have music here which says "DOWN... and LIFT..." I personally prefer the Delaware Valley one because the original tunes are more familiar.

Sandy Nixon's band is a five piece with two accordions and no fiddle. He is one of the few bands who can inspire dancers without the need for a fiddle player. It is indeed scintillating stuff with, again, lots of get up and go.

The Occasionals latest CD is entitled Reel of Four (CD Trax 259) and features Freeland Barbour on accordion and lan Hardie on fiddle. There are 18 tracks played in their distinctive style mostly for old tyme/ceilidh dances but with a couple of country dances for good measure.

Freeland also has a solo album – The Black Water (SKYE CD25) on which he plays piano and accordion. All the music is from the Highlands and Islands and has the tunes of some fine Gaelic songs. I like it a lot.

Lindsay Ross and his Band issued two LPs on the Polydor label in 1967 and 1976. They have now been re-issued on one CD (C FIRST 01). I see from *Reel* No. 141 that I gave high praise to the 1976 one and I do so again. There are no full length dancing tracks but lots of good tunes superbly played. Ron Gonnella shares the front line with Lindsay. Sadly both these gentlemen are no longer with us.

Accordionist David Bowen has been on the Scottish music scene for a number of years now. I see that he played on a Bobby Crowe Society recording (Book 3) back in 1984, but we now have his first album in his own right – Sounds of the Old Morino (DABO DB001). He plays a good varied selection of tunes backed by Dennis Morrison on piano and Billy Thom on drums.

Under the appropriate title "Serenity" the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra's latest CD (RECD 546) is made up almost entirely of slow airs two of which are from the USA. It is truly delightful. There are solos from Paul Jordan and Yla Steven who plays her own lovely composition The Flower of Portencross and Stephen Foster's Gentle Annie.

Alistair McCulloch from Ayrshire has a degree in music and is clearly one of the best of Scotland's younger generation of fiddle players. He is probably best known as a member of the Scottish Fiddle Orchestra's Folk Symphony but he is now following a composing and solo career as well as playing in at least two bands. He has recently published a book with 40 of his own compositions. A CD accompanies the book and Alistair plays all the tunes once through in the order in which they appear in the book. Reels, jigs and waltzes abound. There are a couple of excellent 6/8 marches in pipe mode and a 2/4 dedicated to one of the pianists on the CD, Morag Macaskill of Milngavie. A strathspey in the style of Scott Skinner has also caught my ear and eye. Alistair now has two other CDs. One was reviewed in Reel No. 236 and the other has just come to my notice (FECD 179). Great listening! There are a number of backing instruments with his wife Lyndsay on 'cello and Morag on piano.

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OBITUARY — Donald Wood



Donald died peacefully sitting in his favourite armchair on 10th February 2004, aged 80. His interest in Scottish Country dancing started in 1976 in Tunbridge Wells. He later joined London Branch and whilst at Summer School in 1982 gained his Teacher's Certificate. Donald was a regular supporter of Branch dances, balls and weekend schools. When Stella and Howard Booth left London, Donald took over the running of the Branch Bookstall; he was so keen that he used one room in his house as the Branch bookshop.

There was a lot more to Donald than dancing; he was a qualified SRN and Mental Nurse. Before he retired to the Lake District he was the Senior Sussex Area Teaching Officer, and even after retirement he used these skills when he was offered a two year Administrative post at the then new Kendal Hospital. In his spare time he was a keen gardener, loved cooking and entertaining (being best remembered for his baking and especially for the many 'theme' cakes he made for the Cairngorm Dancers), a mountain rescue volunteer (nursing), and he also helped partially sighted people to get out and about and enjoy a day's rambling in the Lake District.

When his eyesight became a problem, he decided to move to Eastbourne to be near his family (he leaves a son and a daughter) and about three years ago he finally hung up his dancing shoes. However, his failing eyesight didn't stop him seeking adventure as, shortly before his 79th birthday, he went on a group holiday to Germany where, can you believe it, he had a go at hanggliding!

Donald was a kind and gentle man and leaves behind many fond memories of time spent in his company.

Save Your Sanity, Dance More Often!
