CHAIRMAN'S COLUMN

It was wonderful to see the Lower Hall at St. Columba's packed once again with Scottish country dancers, as Spring Fling descended on London in April. It wasn't just the numbers that were impressive, but the age range and enthusiasm of the dancers and the musicians. Many people contributed to the success of that day and the whole weekend, but special thanks to Jim Lindsay for leading and inspiring the musicians' workshop, to Elaine Davies for two years' hard work in bringing Spring Fling to London, and Margaret Shaw for co-ordinating the Branch catering team throughout the weekend. For me it was a reminder of why we enjoy Scottish country dancing, and why we give up our time to serve on committees, or do other things to help our branches and clubs.

It's important to remember that, and to stay positive, even when, generally, attendances at dances and classes are not what they were. As I write, the Branch Committee is wrestling with a significant increase to the cost of hiring the halls at St Columba's, and the sudden unavailability of the school where we hold many of our classes. We'll deal with these



problems, but there are difficult choices for us to make. What aspects of Branch activity do we subsidise, and where do we make the money that will allow us to do that? How far should we venture, in trying to attract new members, and to what extent should we look after our core supporters? How, if at all, should the Branch be different from other SCD societies?

We want your views, so do please come to our AGM on 13 June. We need a decent turn-out to ensure the meeting is quorate, and we are genuinely interested in what you think about the way the Branch is run, and how we should approach the future. You are all part of the Branch, and I am grateful for all that you do. It was really pleasing to talk to a couple of new dancers at one of our events. They commented on how friendly and welcoming we are, in contrast, they said, to some other groups. That's great (for us at least) and it reminds us all that we are ambassadors for the Society and SCD.

Keep up the good work. See you at the AGM and on the dance floor.

Spring Fling – London

17-19 April 2015

After 23 months of planning, thousands of emails, and countless phone calls, Spring Fling 2015 finally arrived in London on the sunny Friday afternoon of 17 April. Spring Fling is an RSCDS event for 12-35 year olds organised by a local team in a different city each year - this year in London, or more specifically, Hounslow.

As the 78 participants trickled in to the Travelodge to register and receive their breakfast bags, the hours of preparation were finally coming to fruition and the weekend started proper.

The first event of the action-packed two days was a joint dance, co-hosted with Chiswick who concentrated on technique for the first class, and more interesting dances and formations in

The programme, devised jointly by Sin See of Chiswick, and Spring Fling, started with The Dashing White Sergeant, which set the tone for the evening of easy and enjoyable dances, allowing the 160 dancers of varying experience levels to enjoy meeting new friends without a lot of crib studying. Ian, Charlotte and Steve of The Borderline Band kept the dancers going and an army of volunteers, led by Iris Ronayne, ensured the dancers were well fed for another energetic half of dancing.





Motion (Proposed by the Management Committee)

With immediate effect the RSCDS London Branch Constitution and Rules shall be amended as follows.

Constitution

XI REPRESENTATION IN THE SOCIETY Delete

Subject to any restrictions on numbers and any procedures contained in the Society's constitution, the Local Association, in General Meeting, shall appoint delegates to attend a General Meeting of the Society and represent the Local Association at such meeting. In the event of a nominated delegate being unable to attend such meeting, an accredited substitute shall be nominated by the Committee of the Local Association subject to the governing document of the Society.

and replace with

Subject to any restrictions on numbers and any procedures contained in the Society's Articles of Association, the Committee of the Local Association shall appoint delegates from among its number to represent the Local Association at general meetings of the Society. Delegates who cannot attend a general meeting of the Society should appoint a proxy from a list of names nominated by the Local Association at its Annual General Meeting. If an insufficient number of names has been put forward, another delegate from the Local Association can act as proxy.

Rules

REPRESENTATION IN THE SOCIETY Delete

24.

In the event of more than the required number of delegates for the Society's Annual General Meeting being nominated at the Annual General Meeting of the Local Association, a ballot of the members attending the Local Association's Annual General Meeting will be arranged.

If less than the required number of delegates for the Society's Annual General Meeting are nominated at the Annual General Meeting of the Local Association, the Committee of the Local Association shall appoint additional delegates up to the required number.

Background note on the motion

At its AGM in November 2014, the RSCDS changed its legal form from that of an association of members to a company limited by guarantee. The principal reason for this change was to limit the personal responsibility of the trustees should the Society become insolvent and then dissolved. The change has no impact on branches other than the point covered by this amendment.

The Society's new Articles of Association and Rules and Procedures (both of which are available on the RSCDS website) give added responsibility to Branch delegates. These are now company-law members and have a continuing role throughout the year, not just at the Society AGM. Company law members, i.e. delegates, can call a general meeting of the Society (along with sufficient likeminded delegates). They have the right to attend and vote at meetings, and may appoint a proxy to attend and vote in their place. With these increased powers in mind, particularly the right to appoint a proxy (who need not be an RSCDS member), the RSCDS recommends that Branch delegates should be members of the Branch Committee

We are therefore proposing that the Committee, rather than the Branch AGM, appoints our Branch delegates at its first meeting following the Branch AGM (at which new Committee members may have been elected). Any delegate who finds they cannot attend the Society AGM could appoint one of the other delegates to act as their proxy. However, this could result in a Branch the size of London having only one person to represent it at the Society AGM. Alternatively, though unlikely, any delegate who cannot attend the Society AGM could appoint a non-dancer to act as their proxy. We think it better in the interests of transparency and credibility for the Branch to have as many delegates or proxies present at the Society AGM as our membership numbers allow (currently about 10), and those delegates should be members closely associated with the Branch.

We propose to set up a 'proxy list' appointed by the Branch AGM. Any London Branch delegate who cannot attend the Society AGM should choose a proxy from that list. This also gives Branch members not on the Committee the opportunity to represent the Branch at the Society AGM. Many have done so in the past.

THE REEL

The Reel is published four times a year by the London Branch and posted free to all Branch members. Non-members may subscribe to be on the mailing list, and clubs can negotiate bulk copies for their members. Enquiries to Wilson Nicol, see advert on p11.

Mary Stoker

16 May 1918 - 20 February 2015

Branch members and many friends were very sad to hear news of the passing of Mary Stoker in February. She took up the role of Branch President Emeritus, having been Branch President from 1996 to 2014.

To parody an old song: "If you knew Mary as we knew Mary, oh oh, what a girl!" Mary was an exuberant dancer, starting as a girl in Glasgow; on the way home after a dance, she and her friends would link arms and dance the *Palais Glide* down the road. Educated at Dunfermline College, Glasgow, Mary moved to London in 1949 to join her husband, Imrie. She was a much sought-after teacher, teaching London Branch classes from 1957 to 1984, as well as a class near her

home in Pinner, and for many years she spent two weeks each summer teaching at the RSCDS Summer School in St Andrews. Mary was also invited to teach abroad, even adjudicating at the Jakarta Highland Games! The Society recognized her contribution by awarding her the Society Scroll in 1997.

For a while, Mary was an examiner of candidates for the Teachers' Certificate, but retired after disagreeing with some aspects of the new Manual. She had firm points of view and wasn't afraid to speak her mind. On one classic occasion, she was asked to examine candidates in the West Country with Bill Ireland. Bill gave her a lift in his car, but, by the time they arrived, they had argued so much about the finer aspects of the pas de basque that they weren't speaking!

As a teacher, one of her expressions was "so", which she used frequently, especially if a decision was questioned by a class member. One member of class realised that she was never chosen to dance in the demonstration team in Holland Park, when she asked why, Mary replied simply "so".

Mary was an inspired and inspiring teacher, always devising a new routine for warm up exercises every week, sometimes basing them on something topical, such as when Torvill and Dean won their Olympic Gold Medals. She was such a professional, even taking the class when she had a migraine, but the class would never have guessed – they were told much later by her pianist. After she had retired from teaching the further education class at Quinton Kynaston School, Swiss Cottage, she was persuaded to come out of retirement to

take an invitation-only class. This was really just another name for the Mary Stoker Fan Club Class.

When she took a class for the Preliminary Teachers' Certificate, the students were somewhat surprised to be told to sit on the floor and chant the rhythmic counting for Rights and Lefts. She was such a perfectionist, demanding the highest level from her class. Both the preliminary and full certificate classes were the most amazing experiences. She had a 100% pass rate, because if she thought that a candidate was not up to it, she wouldn't let them take the exam! When she corrected written homework with her red pen, it wasn't just the dancing that got the treatment, but also the grammar and spelling: nothing got past Mary.

Socially, Mary was excellent company, especially after a drink, and could keep us amused for hours in the evenings at Weekend Schools and AGMs, with her anecdotes and stories about the old days, but many have never been forgotten. Her passing is truly the end of an era.

Sociability, Dance Programmes and Recaps

Dear Jeremy,

I agree with Stephen Webb on p12 of The Reel 291 that unduly complicated dance programmes reduce the sociability of SCD. This is not just because the dancers are too busy concentrating on the figures to interact with each other. If every dance on a normal length programme has to be recapped, it cuts the time available for conversation between dances, and it also makes it difficult to help newcomers. At some clubs there is hardly time to return to one's seat before the next dance is called.

Homework is not the solution. The problem is not just the increasing number of dances. It is also the increasing complexity of the figures involved. Why does The Swirl have a twiddle on the end? It flows much better without this embellishment. As Stephen says, the majority of dances on most programmes are well-known to experienced dancers. For several years medical problems have made it difficult for me to dance every dance on the programme, so I have to sit one out from time to time. Some dances are physically too demanding and automatically go on my 'to avoid' list, which also includes any unfamiliar quick time dance, the crib for which is not easily digestible. Why struggle with unknown dances when there are more than enough old favourites to choose from? As a result I end up dancing about 50% reels and jigs, and 50% strathspeys, rather than the one-third reels, one-third jigs and one-third strathspeys of a normal programme. This could be an ideal formula for a 'Golden Oldies' dance.

Chris Hood suggests on p7 of the same issue that ceilidh dancing may be the future of SCD. Although it is certainly a good way to get young people involved, we must not lose sight of the purpose of our Society. If we lose the elegance of RSCDS-style dancing, all the work of Miss Milligan, Mrs Stewart of Fasnacloich and their successors will have been wasted. Complex dances have their place in dance demonstrations. The majority of dances on a normal programme should be within the capacity of an average dancer.

Taken with a pinch of snuff

Thank you to Peter Knight for drawing my attention to a somewhat unexpected reference to in an article in The Field on snuff. The tastes of Queen Charlotte (1744-1818) were reflected in her being known as 'Snuffy Charlotte', but it was her granddaughter, Princess Charlotte Augusta of Wales (1796—1817), who, on being asked to call a dance at a Royal Juvenile Ball in her grandmother's presence, did so with the

"What a Beau my Granny was, What a Beau was she! She took snuff, and that's enough, And that's enough for me.'

You might recognise the name from the dance recorded as What Beau my Granny was in RSCDS Book 14, dated as 1796, and with an original tune of the same name. That tune has words from an English ballad that end, rather than start, with the words "What A Beau My Granny", so it would appear to have been a different dance. Perhaps the Princess was simply showing her knowledge of popular culture!

Dear Jeremy, Stephen Webb's letter in *The Reel* 291 certainly struck a chord with us. When we started as total beginners in the mid-1990's we never, as far as we can recall, went to any dance or ball where recaps were given. It was usual to learn the dances beforehand, and so we became accustomed to taking a good look at the crib and generally having a talk-through, and sometimes even a walk-through for ourselves, on the morning of the dance so we felt well prepared for the evening's dancing. We still follow this practice to this day and still find it of great benefit. We do appreciate that other dancers may not share this opinion, but it works for us. It is also a way of keeping the brain exercised as well as the feet!

Recaps are useful in their place, e.g. at a dance that is aimed at attracting new or less experienced dancers, but, at a formal event, we feel recaps can disrupt the flow of the evening. We feel that if you stand up for a dance that is unfamiliar, without having previously had a good look at the instructions, a brief recap is not going to be all that helpful, unless you happen to have a photographic memory (but this is purely our own opinion from our own experience).

From our perspective a programme that consists of well-known, well-loved dances, with perhaps just one or two unusual ones, is far more attractive than a programme that would require us to study it to degree standard, both before the event and even at the event. We have been at dances where even with recaps and walkthroughs the dances still go awry, and dancers are missing alternate dances in order to prepare for the next one. This does not make for a very sociable evening. In fact, we do look at the programmes and the bands and, where there is a choice of events on the same night, we do make our choice based on band and programme.

So, please may we have more social dance programmes and fewer programmes that require a marathon effort of study!

Dear Jeremy,

Although I agree with much of what Stephen Webb says, I can't think of anything more boring than doing the same limited range of dances week in, week out. Twice a year, one of our local organisers puts on a dance where 2/3rds are unknown to most of us. I admit I almost always grumble to her when I see the programme for the first time, but I can't remember when I last missed one! For me, the ideal programme is one where I know the majority of dances, but where there are four or five that are either new or a bit more challenging. In case you need reminding, our medical profession keeps telling us that if we are to slow down the incidence of dementia as a nation, we must not only keep our bodies fit, but also our brains! Something that Scottish dancers on the whole are very good at.

Norah Dunn

6 December 1913 - 31 March 2015

Sad news came of the recent passing of Norah Dunn, a mainstay of the Helensburgh Branch since 1943, where she had been Hon President since 1968. She taught at Summer School from 1967, was an examiner from 1974, served on the RSCDS Executive Council for many years and was awarded the Society Scroll in 1989.

Should dancers ever have to sit out?

We have all been at a dance where the right number of dancers to make up the final sets on the dance floor cannot be found. A call for more dancers, a search of the kitchen and elsewhere in the building fails to elicit the missing dancers, and three, or even four, couples have to return to their seats and watch, rather than dance. Watching in itself has its rewards: observing others dancing in a variety of styles can be quite edifying, and, of course, actually listening to the music being played by the band - so often the dancer's mind when dancing merely hears the beat sufficient to get through the dance, with the finer points of tune, harmony and musical emphasis being lost in the anxiety of the occasion.

Should dancers ever have to sit out? I contend they should be included whenever possible, and encouraged to stay on the floor rather than sit down due to lack of numbers. But how can this be possible? Various options do exist. It is true though, that these don't always result in the couples finishing in original positions!

- 1. A 'seven couple set' is created at the bottom of the hall, comprising two joined up sets, one of three couples and the other of four. In this arrangement, the first three of the seven couples stay in a three couple set, and borrow the standing out top couple every second time through, to be their 4th couple. The fourth of the seven couples starts as 1st couple in a four couple set. After one turn, the couple that started fifth of seven becomes the 4th couple in the first set. This is often known as 'begging and borrowing'. This is preferable, I feel, to dancing eight times through in a three couple set, where transitions become awkward and the dance just tiring, or the loss of fun created by a stop-start/rest-dance approach, which is sometimes seen.
- 2. Making a five couple set for a dance for three couples in a four couple set, where the 4th and 5th couples dance the dance once through from top position, and the 4th couple stay in second position as 5th couple is in first position (see Jane Robinson's letter in Scottish Country Dancer No 7 p27 on added benefits of this approach).
- 3. A 5th couple stands ready to swap into a four couple dance (or 6th couple in a five couple dance): each time the dancing couple gets to the bottom they step down, and the standing couple steps up. This approach could be adopted in square/triangular sets with a new couple changing in and out every time, but is not really recommended, as concentration and alertness is needed, all the more when joining from the sidelines, and enjoyment can be lost through lack of flow.
- 4. Five couple dances such as Earlstoun Loch and Airie Bennan can have a further two (or even four - not recommended) couples added at the bottom and the dance started with first. third, fifth (and seventh) couples.
- 5. A two couple dance can be danced in a three couple rather than a four couple set. All couples dance the dance through twice, with the starting 1st and 2nd couples able to dance as top couple an extra time each.

In setting out these options I hope clubs may be encouraged to acquaint their dancers with them, and hence give them confidence to take on a variation on a theme for the benefit of others, and to ask MCs to be brave and not take the noninclusive approach of, "Sorry, you will need to sit this one out"!



Instead you can sit back and enjoy excellent entertainment, along the lines of listening to a ceilidh, with a mixture of dance music, piping, singing and recitation. The musicians comprise Corryvrechan members and friends, excellent musicians from all over the country. They combine to create a well-knit band sound, with all parts audible, though some may miss having a drum. Several get solo spots, including Chris Oxtoby and Ann Stonehouse, leader and fiddler respectively of the Strathallan Band. I particularly enjoyed Chris' innovative arrangement of Shetland tunes, finishing with the classic *Calgary Fiddlers' Welcome to Shetland* and Ann's playing of Marie Fielding tunes, both accompanied by Martin Cairns. Elsewhere, George Maybury's pipes come across particularly well, with the band backing, and I also enjoyed Andrew Telford's baritone. Altogether a great evening!

Tribute to William Hannah – Luke Daniels, Neil Ewart, Ian Carr and John Paul Gandy, published by Greentrax Records, available to download for £7.99 from itunes, emusic.com, or on CD at £11.69 from Music in Scotland (01631 719 001) or other online sources.

A significant gap in my knowledge of the history of Scottish dance music has been plugged with the recent acquisition of this recording of music as played by William Hannah. Those with piles of dusty 78s may already be fair

played by William Hannah. Those with piles of dusty 78s may already be familiar with this melodeon virtuoso of the 1920s, who was at the forefront of recording Scottish dance music, and also in the development of the instruments used by Jimmy Shand and other more recent and familiar names.

Born in 1891 in the mining community of Blackburn, West Lothian, Hannah served in the First World War in the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, and was a Home Guard Lieutenant in the Second World War, during which time he saved several lives by disposing of a live grenade. He was later injured by a bomb, and was awarded the MBE in 1944. He died in 1961.

In peacetime he divided his time between being head postman in Bathgate and travelling the country on his motorcycle to record for Columbia and Parlophone, and play for dances. At least once he drove to London to play – can anyone fill in the gaps on that story?

Here, Luke Daniels, perhaps better known for Irish-style and contemporary box playing, has painstakingly recreated arrangements from Hannah's many wax cylinder recordings and combines with fiddler Neil Ewart, pianist John Paul Gandy and guitarist Ian Carr to re-create a style highly evocative of the inter-war years. Daniels plays a Wilkinson Excelsior, the melodeon favoured by Hannah, which he found in a loft and had restored. All the musicians play their part, with Ewart's *portamento* and Gandy's *glissandi* contributing to a classic dance band sound we rarely hear now.

As with the CD above, try as I might to present this as a CD for dancing, the tracks are best treated as for listening, though you could have some fun with dancers by choosing *The Dashing White Sergeant*, starting without a chord, turning into a jig after 64 bars, and speeding up towards the end; or *The Glasgow Highlanders*, starting with two chords, but no lead-in note, and finishing 16 bars short of 4x32! But throughout I found myself smiling at the joy of the music, some great waltzes, and a wonderful *Boston Two Step* to what is described as the original jaunty 2/4 hornpipe by Luke Cavendish Everett. Great fun!

Marvellous Mirth in Madrid

It was the first weekend in March, and it did not have a very promising start: arriving at Gatwick, I had to queue to drop off my suitcase, bulging with kilt, jacket and all the other Scottish dancer's accoutrements. The prim woman behind the counter looked at me and asked where I was flying to. "Madrid", I said. After studying my passport, she put a MAD sticker on my luggage. Why be so judgemental, I thought? However, when I arrived at my destination, I found out that we were all judged the same. But if you expected the 21st Iberian Gathering to be a pandemonium of lunatics, you'd be sorely disappointed. It was a very sane, friendly and jolly meeting of about 170 Scottish dancers from Spain, Portugal, Scotland, England, and quite a few other countries. Indeed, there were participants from as far afield as Vancouver and Abu Dhabi.

The Gathering took place in a four-star hotel, conveniently situated near the airport, and its organisation was faultless. The organisers really went to town to get the best: Jessie Stuart from Keith was an inspiring teacher, getting the most from all the participants with various degrees of dancing experience; we were introduced to interesting dances such as Findlater Castle and The Dowry Bride. She also MC'd the evening dances with remarkable clarity. First-class music was provided by Ian Muir and the Craigellachie band - not only for the evening dancing, but for the morning classes, too. The Saturday evening ball started with a Grand March to live pipe music. Fancy finding a piper in Spain! The programme included a challenging new square

dance medley, *The Iberian Gathering*, devised by a Schiehallion Group member, Fiona Pérez.

Admittedly, for us non-Iberians the time schedule was slightly disconcerting. The Spanish people seem to be living in a quite separate time zone. The evening dancing did not start until 9.30pm, with the finish at 1.00am. Add to it the après-dance socialising and your bed time shifts to near three o'clock in the morning. But the ample and delicious breakfasts and dinners kept us fortified to face the excesses of the Spanish time scales and still be fit for the morning class.

The afternoon walk-throughs were very helpful, especially for the less experienced dancers. We dancers were expertly and very efficiently prepared for the evening programme by the two ladies who are the teachers of the Madrid Schiehallion Group: Susana Page and Fiona Pérez. Last year Susana was awarded the RSCDS teacher's certificate and this has been a very positive contribution to the Madrid Scottish dancing scene. I extended my stay by a few more days and was able to join the group's regular Tuesday meeting. There were 18 people, all very keen to dance, in spite of a floor hardly suited to Scottish dancing. Indeed, the dance studio was primarily meant for flamenco dancers, and the deep traces of their stamping heels marked the surface all over the place. But, in spite of these adverse conditions, both Susana and Fiona managed to make a success of several dances that evening.

Next year's Iberian Gathering is going to take place in Jerez in southern Spain and I am already contemplating travelling there, hoping that it is going to be as successful as the one in Madrid this year that I enjoyed so much. Even though I am generally very forgetful, I do not think I am going to forget easily this excellent Madrid event!

News from RSCDS Headquarters

- Recent HQ meetings have continued to consider the financial situation, in light of declining membership. While they continue to consider ways to increase membership, the Board has concluded that a complete re-think on structure is necessary. Board members will be looking, therefore, at alternative ways for the Society to operate, and the Chairman will address this issue in a forthcoming column in Scottish Country Dancer. He will also address the possibility of an increase in membership subscription;
- Work is progressing on the transfer of RSCDS to a Company Limited by Guarantee (CLG). The Board approved the resolution for the transfer, and the inaugural meeting of the new CLG was held on 28 February;
- Plans are in hand to recruit a replacement for Elizabeth Foster, Secretary/Executive Officer, who will retire in June 2015:
- A dedicated page on the website is planned for the Jean Milligan Memorial Fund (JMMF), with application form, guidelines, and information about the fund;
- It is hoped that the new Dance Trad pack, a follow-on to the Dance Scottish pack and a companion to Jigs and Reels, will be ready for July 2015. The schools' accreditation scheme has generated a lot of interest and is growing;
- The Board agreed by a majority to the formation of a Youth Branch:

- Experienced tutors have been invited to express interest in being considered as examiners:
- It is hoped that DuK, winners of the new music competition in 2013, will now commence recording in July 2015;
- Book 49 will be available in July 2015. It includes 12 brand new dances for dancers from intermediate to advanced level. The book features new formations that have never previously featured in RSCDS dances including The Rose and The Celtic Reel. The accompanying CD for Book 49 has been recorded by Jim Lindsay and includes five additional tracks not connected with the Book, including selected dances from *Miss Milligan's Miscellany* not previously recorded by the RSCDS and some listening tracks. Subject to Board approval, it is hoped also to film the dances, as well as those from Unit 2.
- The possibility of releasing music of the Book 49 dances in 8, 16 and 24 bar phrases is being investigated, for the benefit of teachers with no recourse to live music, possibly to be released as digital downloads;
- The 3rd Edition of the Manual is now available in electronic format from the RSCDS shop, the first RSCDS publication available in electronic format. Other publications and recordings in electronic format are anticipated over the coming months. The Manual is also available on an RSCDS-branded memory stick;

The Place to be!

Sunday afternoon – well, these days for dancing it has to be a Tea Dance. Yes, but this one with a difference, of course tea and cakes and excellent homemade cakes at that, including the proverbial chocolate sponge! Why different? Fund raising is a great excuse for a dance and this one raised a princely £968. Those coming, and we numbered about 80, were very generous and at a weekend too where *Comic Relief* had figured highly in the giving calendar. What was surprising with the numbers was that the 15 March was also Mother's Day! The venue was the excellent St George's Church Hall in Newbury – so light and bright with a good wooden floor to dance on.

What's it all about, you may ask? Devotees of *The Reel* will recall the photo and article in issue 285 by Jenny Robertson on fundraising for her church youth trip to build homes in Mexico for the homeless. Over Easter next year, Jenny will be going again to support Project ReBuild, this time with her brother Tom (who many of you will know is an accomplished drummer, often to be found playing alongside his dad, Ian).

At the Tea Dance, treating us to sublime playing were three exponents of SCD music each often found playing solo, yet put together they are greater that the sum of their parts. Ian Muir (now RSCDS Director of Music), Judith Muir and Ian Robertson (her brother), and this combination made for a great line up where crafting lively balanced sets of music for us to dance to was simply second nature – it was also clear, watching them interact, that they enjoyed playing together. A warm social atmosphere prevailed with friends coming to the event from as far as 70 miles away!

The dance programme, compiled and MC'd by Ruben Freemantle, included a selection of popular dances and one fun dance, new to me, *Gallagher's Rant*, a particular favourite in the Newbury area. Many words of thanks and appreciation were said by Jenny and the organisers, but, as in so many situations like this, it is us dancers who really hold a feeling of thanks within us, which, although it is reflected in our applause, never seems quite sufficient for the effort and work put in to organising such a generous helping of what we like best – Scottish country dancing!

- Due to resourcing constraints, work on volume 2 of the Imperial dances has been postponed until Summer 2016. Other publications for release over the next eighteen months or so include: a revised and expanded Index to Formations and Movements, the next edition of the combined A5 books (books 25 to 30) and further CDs of the recordings of the remaining unrecorded Miss Milligan's Miscellany dances:
- The booklet for Unit 2 Prescribed Dances has been updated in line with Standard Terminology and is now available from the shop. The list of dances has not changed;
- Teaching notes for books 46, 47, 48 and *Queen's Diamond Jubilee Book* have been updated and are available on the website;
- Spring Fling 2016 will be held in Edinburgh, and, in 2017, it will head back to Europe with central Germany as the likely location;
- The UK Youth Workshops are becoming popular and it is hoped to identify locations outside the UK to organise others. In the meantime, plans are under way for Oxford (21 November) and Perth later this year, with Newcastle and Manchester in 2016.
