From the Chair: Joanne Lawrence

With any new role it is always instructive to see how others have approached its various tasks. As the very new Chair of RSCDS London Branch, whilst still a comparatively new dancer (since 2014), it made sense to look back at earlier columns for guidance and inspiration.

The first Reel columns from recent new chairs have followed a general pattern. Acknowledgement of the honour in being asked to take on the role, recognition of the immense contribution of those who have gone before, promotion of the many enticing dance opportunities of the new season and a sombre reflection on the need to recruit young dancers combined with a call to members to support the Branch in whatever way

This column is, I suppose, no different and yet the times we live and hope to dance in have no precedent in the history of the RSCDS. As I write, there have been no London Branch dances or classes for more than 15 months but the remaining COVID-19 restrictions in England are due to be lifted and we are starting to believe that we may indeed dance together once more.

I am grateful to outgoing Chair, Jim Cook, for his steady support of a dancing community unable to dance; to his immediate predecessor, Margaret Catchick, whose commitment to the Branch in general and its 90th Anniversary celebration in particular, endured and gave hope to many of us, despite repeated setbacks; and to Andrew Kellett, London Branch chair 2013-16, who, as RSCDS Chair 2018-20, had the unenviable task of leading the global Scottish country dance community at a time when physical contact and travel was forbidden. I am truly honoured to follow where they, and others, have led.

I am proud to be part of a Society that has kept its members in touch with each other and dancing albeit in kitchens and in sitting rooms. The Society newsletter and weekly classes threw us a lifeline when we were suddenly bereft of all usual social outlets. In London, members responded magnificently to Branch communications and the eUpdate was rarely short of imaginative videos, dances, quizzes and reflective articles. As the year wore on, we ventured into virtual events and were again brilliantly supported by the musicians, singers, dancers, speakers, quiz setters and all attendees in the community, peaking with 330 logons from 13 different countries for the Burns Night at Home (subsequently viewed a further 730 times online).

We have learned a lot in the last year. From feedback in the members' survey, we know that the great appetite for a safe return to dance is tempered with concern about late night travel and increased costs from the congestion charge and ULEZ. We have realised that the virtual events can have a role long after the pandemic in improving access to the Branch's activities for those prevented, by health or distance, from attending in person. We have quantified what we already knew: that the lack of younger dancers represents a growing generation gap which must be bridged if our family class members are to keep dancing in their teen years and beyond.

As the new season opens, momentum will rebuild swiftly from the New Season dance with the resumption of classes, 90th Anniversary Ball, Autumn Wednesday dance and Day School all before the end of October. But, alongside this welcome resumption of all that London Branch does well, we need more. We cannot secure the future of the Branch by simply doing what has always been done and, during the long months of lockdown, inspired by the feedback from members and friends of the Branch, the management committee has begun to develop ideas of what might be possible with the right approach and support. We will share more of these ideas in the coming months and invite input from all.

COVID-19 may have removed dance abruptly from our lives, but London Branch members and other dancers have shown that the heart of the community is strong. Dance will return and each of us has a role to play in helping it to grow and to flourish. I look forward to talking, working and dancing with you.

PS: I was honoured to receive a Branch award at the recent AGM for work on the eUpdate and virtual meetings. As noted above, these represented the contributions of a wide swathe of Branch members and friends. It has been a privilege to work with each one.

From the Outgoing Chair: Jim Cook

At our Branch AGM, the reins of being Chair were passed to Joanne. I therefore thank the Branch for the honour of my being Chair for the last two years. I also thank the Committee, and all those who have supported me in so many ways, during this trying period for the Branch and the world.

I think I can safely say that no Chair has ever presided over such a period before, thanks to COVID-19. Let us hope that no future Chair experiences anything similar. However, my Chairmanship ended on a high note with the announcement at our Branch AGM of the Branch Awards to be presented to Joanne Lawrence, Meryl and Ian Thomson and Stephen Webb. As you will read on p12, I presented Meryl and Ian with their

actual award at their home. But, with the demise of our 90th Anniversary Garden Party in July, Joanne and Stephen's presentation will now take place at our Grand Ball.

But now is the time to look ahead. A full programme of classes and dances is planned and, to lead the way, I welcome Joanne as our new Chair. Joanne has excellent plans for the future, and it makes so much sense for the Branch to start afresh in all respects with the commencement of the new season. Meanwhile, as Vice Chair, I shall be supporting Joanne and, alongside her, I shall be promoting the Branch's activities.

I therefore wish Joanne and the Branch every success for the future.

Branch Accounts 2020 - 21: Treasurer, Simon Wales

To say that this was not the most active year in the Branch's 90 year history would be somewhat of an understatement!

Despite the fact that there was no activity on classes, dances, family classes, or demonstration team, we

were legally required to produce accounts for our AGM, which were approved by the members present. Here is a summary of the published accounts.

At 31 March 2021 the Branch's net worth of £76,641 was represented by the undernoted funds:

There was a net operating surplus of £3,957 (budget was to break even) and an unrealised gain on investments of £9,568, recouping most of the 2019-2020 losses.

Publicity and The Reel

The Reel made a loss of £1,658. This was mainly due to a loss of advertising revenue, partly offset by producing slightly smaller editions. There was £151 expenditure on publicity for the website.

Membership

Membership numbers have reduced but not significantly, and we are grateful to our loyal members for their continued support. London Branch benefited by £441 as a result of the reduction of the HQ levy.

Donations and Legacies

Donations and legacies raised £1,548 most of which benefited from HMRC gift aid.

Looking forward

We have committed to spending this unbudgeted surplus to kick start events in the coming season.

CD Review: Jeremy Hill



C'est L'amour (8x32J), Postie's Jig (4x32J), Lucy Campbell (4x32R), The Flying Scotsman (4x32R), The Gay Gordons, Waltzes, Old Time and listening tracks

Previous releases also available: The Band Boys (1998); The Friockheim Barn Dance (2003); 25 Years of Music (2006); Fine Mix (2008); Something Old, Something New (2016), available for £10 each or three for £20. All five CDs are also available on a USB stick with 16 page booklet for £30. Free postage in UK.

The latest lockdown release to come my way is from Steven Carcary and Graham Bell, which follows the pattern of Steven's previous releases: mixing country dance tracks with a range of other styles, demonstrating great versatility. On this occasion, rather than the full band, Steven and Graham have put the recording together with the proverbial 'box of tricks': midi and multi-tracking allowing them to simulate an entire band. It is a really full sound, and you would be hard pushed to tell the difference.

There are four country dance tracks, starting with a jaunty *C'est L'Amour*, matching the published original *Pleasures of the Night* with two of Steven's own tunes in a well-integrated set. There is an excellent *Lucy Campbell* using traditional tunes, though only four times through, and Graham Bell takes the lead in a set for *Postie's Jig*. Tempo and balance are good throughout.


Where is the most outlandish place you have worn your kilt? Or the most embarrassing situation caused by wearing it? We would like to know - with discreet pictures!

The recording has four different waltz sets, one with traditional Scottish tunes, two with modern tunes from Ian Lees and Steven himself, and a set of Blair Douglas's tunes. I referred to a waltz in my review of Liam Stewart's recording as "at a pace that would challenge any waltzers"; that was at 250 BPM, whereas these are similar to the tempo of a Viennese waltz - 150-180 BPM (beats per minute) according to official ballroom sources. Ballroom dancers can also enjoy a smooth Rumba and a Jazzy Swingers/Quickstep medley.

One of my favourite tracks was a *Tribute to Angus Fitchet*, combining three of the great fiddler's tunes. For those looking for something different, there is also a Shadows' medley, of *Wonderful Land* and *Theme for Young Lovers*. All told this makes an excellent selection, whether for dancing or listening.

Listening also to Steven's back catalogue, I found very much the same story of consistently excellent playing across a range of styles, and something for everyone. Bill Ewan (piano), Malcolm Ross (drums) and Gillian Ramsay (fiddle) are among some great company in recordings of a full band (even up to seven players at times), and a similar range of country dances and other styles. It is a great value pack.

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The Story behind the Dance: Meryl Thomson


Lady Susan Stewart's Reel - A Tale of Two Ladies

Since this is one of the older dances on the 90th Anniversary Grand Ball programme, I wondered about its origins.

The dance Lady Susan Stewart's Reel is found in RSCDS Book 5. The original dance was copied from Caledonian Country Dances Vol 2 part III or IV c.1754 by Mrs Ysobel Stewart, according to her handwritten note on the cover of her notebook. Here is her transcription of the tune:



The RSCDS published dance is pretty much the same as the original instructions copied by Mrs Stewart:



The tune has had various titles. Robert Bremner in his 1757 collection of music with no dance instructions, A Collection of Scots Reels or Country Dances, calls the tune Had the Lass till I winn at her. A dance which is mostly different from the 1754 version, but with the same tune, appears under the name Had the Lass till I win at her in Rutherford's Compleat Collection of 200 of the most celebrated country dances Volume 2 from 1759. As Haud the Lass till I come at her the tune appears in various tune books including the 1770 manuscript of William Vickers who is believed to have lived in Northumberland.



By 1840 the tune was also known as Lads of Boat; or Had the Lass till I wear at her in the John Rook handwritten manuscript from Wigton, Cumbria. One of the latest versions seems to be in Kerr's Merrie Melodies Vol 4 from the 1880s where it is called Haud the Lass Till I Come at Her. David Johnson in his book Scottish Fiddle Music of the Eighteenth Century points out that tunes with scandalous names such as this were generally not played in company after 1800 without causing great embarrassment. William Ross published it in his Collection of Pipe Music in 1885 under the name Miss Victoria Ross - tunes could be renamed to flatter sponsors or honour people. The tune, under its more scandalous name, continued to be popular in music collections in spite of, or perhaps because of, its name!

So, who was Lady Susan Stewart?



Our first candidate (above) was born on 10 April 1767 and she was the second daughter of John Stewart, 7th Earl of Galloway, and his second wife, the former Anne Dashwood. Aged 24, Susan married George Spencer-Churchill, the future 5th Duke of Malborough. George was the great great grandfather of Sir Winston Churchill. They had four children and on the death of the 4th Duke, she became Duchess of Marlborough, living in the splendid Blenheim Palace. She died at the age of 73 in her house in Park Lane, London and was buried at Blenheim Palace.

As you might have noticed, this Lady Susan Stewart was not born until some 13 years after the date Mrs Stewart gave for the source of the dance. Did the dance therefore refer to another Lady Susan Stewart?

Candidate two (below) is Lady Susanna Stewart who was born in 1742/3 in Scotland and was the eldest daughter of Alexander Stewart, 6th Earl of Galloway (and aunt to our first candidate).



Susanna, who was also known as Lady Susan Stewart, married Granville Leveson-Gower in 1768, becoming the Marchioness of Stafford in 1786. The family lived in Stafford and had a central role in the politics and society of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Susanna was a political hostess (her husband was a career diplomat and British Ambassador to Russia) and a collection of her letters in *The Granville Archive* stored in The British Library provides a fascinating insight into the French Revolution. Susanna died in 1805 in Mayfair, London.

Dances or tunes named for Lady Susan Stewart are few. The dance Lady Susan Stewart's Strathspey appears in Miss Milligan's Miscellany with suggested music by Nan Main and there is a strathspey tune called Lady Susan Stewart's written by Malcolm MacDonald in his 1788 Collection of Strathspey Reels etc. MacDonald lived for a while around Dunkeld and is said to have played the cello for Niel Gow.

Although I have several volumes of Walsh/Johnson's Caledonian Country Dances, I have not been able to track down the particular volume from which Mrs Stewart copied Lady Susan Stewart's Reel and several other dances and tunes in her notebook number eight available from the RSCDS archives. If anybody knows anything more about this volume I would love to hear from you.

What do we do and for whom?

I took on the role of convenor of Education and Training after a year as convenor elect, working with Malcolm Brown in his final year as convenor.

However, my term of office ends in November 2022, currently the Society will be looking for a convenor elect in November 2021 at the RSCDS Annual General Meeting.

I have served on the Education and Training Committee, over several years, so thought I knew the ins and outs of it all. It has always been a passion of mine to assist others to learn and to teach. Therefore, Education and Training was the one for me.

The committee is made up of eight members, some of whom are RSCDS

teachers and examiners. If you are a motivated individual, passionate about Scottish country dancing, and can bring vision, enthusiasm, relevant experience and/or skills to the committee and work effectively and collaboratively on the development of the Society we would love to have you join us.

Over the past two years I have been blessed with a committee which is indeed made up of exactly that. We have worked hard as a team, and it has been a pleasure to work together.

During these two years we have looked into, and updated, where necessary, the Dancing Achievement Awards, Medal Tests, Examinations and worked on the new award (Core Training for Instructors) which is based on teaching a class but without the rigours of the current examination system. This will not replace that system. The project was begun by Malcolm Brown but needed some more thought and refinement. It has taken much time and

effort on the part of the committee but we now have twenty six teachers worldwide, who have undergone on-line training to assist non-certificated teachers to become instructors.

We have also selected and appointed several probationary examiners who are awaiting the current health situations to be lifted to enable examinations to take place again and to allow them to finish their training.

We have also seen the introduction of a working group for Scottish Step and Highland dancing. They are working on updating the library of Scottish Step dances, the re-introduction of Step and Highland classes to the daily programme of Summer School in St Andrews, and to workshops and schools throughout the world

I have helped out in a small way with Dance Scottish At Home which has gone a long way to keep everyone involved and motivated. It was very sad that RSCDS Schools were cancelled, but virtual events have been used to replace these events.

All the Convenors report to the Management Board regarding the committees' developments, plans and hopes for the future.

The return to dancing will have to be taken rather slowly to begin with. At present we in Scotland can dance outdoors but I have high hopes that dancing indoors will be back on our agenda very soon, in the UK and in other parts of the world where Scottish country dancing is enjoyed. I also hope that all RSCDS Schools and other workshops and day schools will be back up and running in 2022. We hope to see you all again with more fun, friendship and happy dancing to come.



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How I Started Dancing

Featuring a couple, for the first time in this series. Alan Ip and Hamish Todd relate their journeys into the world of Scottish country dancing.

It was a chilly December evening in 2012. Christmas was over, Strictly Come Dancing had been and gone and I was contemplating the prospect of several long and

dreary months of dismal weather. I decided dancing would be good for the spirit and the waistline.

We once went to a barn dance at a friend's wedding which was a good laugh. We also had one at our civil partnership where everyone joined in. It seemed a good idea to take it up. Searches on barn dance and ceilidh dance pointed me to a couple of reeling and ceilidh clubs not far from home. Then I looked for similar groups near Islington where I used to work. The Gay Gordons came up first but it was Scottish country dancing. Was that the same thing? I made contact to get some information, hoping something would put me off. Nothing did.

So, on 23 January 2013 I experienced Scottish country dancing for the first time. As the saying goes, I never looked back. The first evening was scary but great fun. Naturally I had little awareness of what was happening. Reel? Left-hand across? Strathspey? Did you say a poussette? The rest of the group was very helpful in pushing me in the right direction or grabbing me back to place when I overshot. I initially gave myself three months to see how I would get on and if I didn't like it, I would move on to something else. Needless to say, I loved it and bought my first pair of gillies after four weeks

The next hurdle was to learn the steps and formations. The internet was an enormous help. Had it not been for YouTube, (yes, the quality of dancing can sometimes be dubious...) and Keith Rose's diagrams, progress would have been far slower. I recall spending hours and hours watching one particular video called *Zero to Pas de Basque in 64 Bars* and trying to follow along. My mind was totally blown and I thought it was completely beyond me.

I went to my first London Branch Day School that October. I learned an enormous amount that day, not just about doing the steps properly, but also about the light and shade of the formations and the social aspect of dancing. You know, looking at your partner.

Now I was ready to tackle a social dance at Pont Street. I found the programme, printed off the mini crib and the diagrams. Wow, 20 dances! I used my commute in the fortnight leading up to the event to study the diagrams and watched videos every evening in a bid to memorise all the dances. Indeed, I treated it like preparing for an exam. My stomach was churning as I sat on the tube going to St Columba's

Church. I walked through the doors and was greeted by a cheery hello from Rachel Wilton. She put me at ease straightaway and invited me to the first dance. I remember it was *Flowers of Edinburgh*, which Grace taught us at the Day School. Talk about applying what you learned.

Well, that was the start of my dancing journey. There have been further milestones, such as going to my first Summer Tuesdays, no recap - horror upon horror! To my first ball and wearing a kilt and Prince Charlie jacket for the first time. But the best one was to convince my husband, Hamish, to start Scottish country dancing. You can read all about it in his story below.

Despite my Scottish name and heritage, my main exposure to Scottish dancing in my youth was listening to my grandmother's Jimmy Shand records. My parents did go to Scottish country dancing classes

for a while and at the age of six or seven I was taken along but it did not go well! I may be half Scottish, but I fear my feet are not in the Scottish half!

Fast forward nearly 50 years. When Alan took up Scottish country dancing, I was intrigued and puzzled by the little diagrams he was studying. The music he listened to brought back happy memories and had my toes tapping. I went along to a few Gay Gordons classes with him. Everyone was very welcoming but, of course, I hadn't a clue what I was doing and I was self-conscious about spoiling things for the others. Finally, in 2015, Alan discovered the wonderful RSCDS London Branch Beginners' Class in Richmond, run by the talented and infinitely patient Judith Jones. Mel Rowland, now Branch Secretary, was in the same class and together we grappled with what seemed infernally complicated manoeuvres like teapots, rights and lefts and reels of three. But with Judith's perseverance and a lot of swotting on YouTube, I made progress. It took a while till I felt ready to join dances at Pont Street but the Wednesday evening dances arranged for beginners are a fantastic opportunity for new dancers to 'find their feet'. As well as with the Gay Gordons, I dance regularly at Surbiton and at Wimbledon Reels, all very friendly and welcoming groups. Huge thanks to all those who have got me through dances with a nod or a shove.

Over the last five years (not counting the pandemic hiatus!), Scottish dancing has become a hugely important part of my life, improving my fitness, my wardrobe and my social life in equal measure.

Scottish country dancing has enabled us to meet many lovely people and given us the chance to dance whenever we travel. We smile from ear to ear when we dance. Not because all the teachers told us to, but as an outward manifestation of the immense joy we feel inside. It is definitely one of the best things we have ever done.



Stephen responds:

I must say I am delighted to be given this Branch Award and let me thank London Branch Committee very much for proposing me.

Although being a Branch member, often Long -Term, since 1973 my association with *The Reel* began under Andrew Kellett's tenure as editor, I had written the odd letter

that had been published, but when I learned in 1993 that *The Reel* was in need of a type-setter and printer my thoughts immediately went to my late good friend John Reeve who had previously worked in publishing; he took on the task with unbridled enthusiasm. I would add at this point that a year earlier I had suggested a solution to the clashing of dance dates and the SE Diary was born and Anne and John King made it happen.

This award reflects my work as copy editor for the 13 editions since, at my instigation, going full colour. But in my mind my contribution to *The Reel*, based on the dual imperatives of promoting Scottish dancing and promoting the London Branch, dates back further. As Michael Caine might have said "not many people know that" ... when Wilson took over as editor in 2005, right up to last year, I became the main proofreader. Also, in that year I instigated our 75th Anniversary Book of 13 dances.

From 1996, I started to submit dancingrelated photos for inclusion in *The Reel*, which I would generally especially take, steadily increasing the number from a trickle to 914 at the last count. I also have since 1994 written, 170 articles, obituaries and letters, on Scottish matters which were also published.

Early in 2016 I began a campaign, supported by our then chairman Andrew, to collect and collate a complete set of unmarked original *Reels* for The British Library Collection. This is reported on, in *Reel* 296.

My other London Branch initiatives were: setting up the material for a comprehensive website archive of Pat Batt poems, PDF sets of past *Reels* and The Thistle Scottish magazines. And more recently launching The Mary Isdale MacNab Collection Archive and also co-ordinating the 90th Anniversary Dance Deviser's Competition - still ongoing.

Lives Remembered

An Extraordinary Talent

from Joan Desborough

Colin Robertson

24 August 1941 - 28 June 2021



Colin was born in Reading and was taken, age seven, by his parents to the Reading St. Andrews Society social dancing evening each Wednesday that also included some tuition. He was a talented dancer and also

learnt highland dancing, perfecting his technique with lessons from Pipe Major Peter Quinn in London. He became a successful competitive highland dancer including competing in some Highland games in Scotland. In addition to dancing, he was a drummer in the Reading St. Andrews Pipe Band. Sometimes Colin provided the music for his classes on his tin whistle.

I met Colin in the early 1960s when I moved from the beginners' highland class to a more advanced class In Reading. He also taught me Scottish country dancing when I joined his demonstration team called *The Reivers* which consisted of people who were not necessarily already good dancers, but under Colin's guidance were encouraged to dance to the best of their ability and perform some complex choreography successfully. Colin felt that Scottish country dancing is for all to enjoy, and I remember him saying, "if your class cannot follow a dance, look to the teacher." At that time, he also ran the Reading University SCD class.

In the early 1970s Colin and Lewis Innes started the Scottish National Dance Company. This enabled Colin to have a troupe of good dancers, based in London, who enjoyed performing his imaginative choreography, both country and highland dancing. A video of one display, from the Tonbridge Ceilidh 1990, can be found via the London Branch MacNab Archive for The First of August. For a few years he also guided the rehearsals of The Strathreelers, a team who used to compete in the country dancing competitions in the south-east.

Colin's professional career was as a scientific glass blower at Imperial college London, but his passion was dancing. He married an American fiddler, Terie, and in due course they moved to Oregon where Colin continued to teach.



Archie was born in Ayrshire in 1930. At school, he excelled in the sciences and after gaining a doctorate in nuclear physics from Glasgow University, he headed south for work in Chelmsford, Luton and Reading. Archie was passionate about Scottish culture, and dancing in particular, so it was not surprising that he joined a Scottish dancing group where he met his wife Rosemary.

After he and Rosemary married, the family settled in Hyde Heath near Amersham where Archie worked at the Atomic Energy Authority and, later, in medical research at Amersham International. In retirement, he was able to enjoy walking, cruising and gardening, but he was also generous with his time supporting local organisations as a school governor, President of Amersham Scottish Association and a representative of the Hyde Heath HS2 Forum.

For many years, Archie was a stalwart of the Lucy Clark Club (in three different locations), maintaining a keen interest in the Club's affairs and supporting from the sidelines. Latterly, despite having mobility difficulties, Archie continued to dance, his clear mind seeming to race ahead of his body to guide him into place. He always knew where he should be, which gave everyone confidence.
