OBITUARY

ROBERT FERGUSON



It was with great sadness that we learnt of the death of Robert Ferguson, who died suddenly at his home on the 21st October.

Robert was instrumental in reviving the London Branch immediately after the war and helping it grow into the organisation we know today, and we remember him with

affection and gratitude for his hard work over many years.

In the 1940s there was only a little Scottish Country Dancing in London and that was organised by his mother. Isobel Maclennan (Mac) was his first teacher, in north Kent, then Marjorie Sandison (Sandy) in the famous classes in Lambeth according to Robert, both ladies were unrelenting perfectionists.

At first, there were no Branch functions. There were occasional hops (with piano) in a first floor hall in Euston where Robert, as MC, had to make up a set if 7 or 15 people came to dance. (There were never three sets and no room anyway). Later regular dances with a band, run by Ronnie Ryall, a stalwart member of the Branch Committee, were held in the Royal Scottish Corporation Hall in Fetter Lane. For years only one band was used, indeed the only one available in the south east of England. The class prospectus developed, offering five different grades of ability. Many classes and clubs sprang up in the London suburbs and adjacent areas, driven by Branch members.

When Robert was Branch Secretary (a post he held for 7½ years) as well as membership secretary, the membership was around 1000 and has remained more or less so ever since. He hired Porchester Hall, which became a regular venue until comparatively recently and the Seymour Hall, to accommodate just some of the people who wanted to dance to Jimmy Shand's band. There were 700 dancers, with hundreds turned away.

Robert, together with Hugh Foss, was instrumental in establishing the first Ball at the Hyde Park Hotel, which became an annual event.

After Robert completed his term as Secretary, he was Vice-President for a number of years, becoming President after the death of James Garvie. Unfortunately pressure of work and the demands of a growing family prevented him from giving what he considered to be enough of his time to the Branch and he decided to resign and take a back seat in the mid 70s.

Despite this, Robert took a tremendous interest in the activities of the Branch and his influence and knowledge was sought after by countless members of the Committee over the years.

His last act for the Branch was the informative history of the Branch, published in the last *Reel* for the 75th Anniversary year.

We extend our sympathy to Alison and his family at this sad time.



MEET STEWART ADAM, NEW RSCDS CHAIRMAN



Where do you start to talk about yourself? I decided to take my guide from the web to give the impression I am up to date. Well, use the WWW at least to change it to Why, Where and What.

Why did I start dancing? Being brought up in Gala (Galashiels to the uninitiated) I had the usual course of Scottish Country Dancing at primary school. In fact one of my primary teachers was the daughter of R.M. Duthie who wrote Ellwyn Fairy Glen - walked up it often. My mother was a very keen dancer as was my father till his knees gave out. So there was always Scottish dance music in the house and my mother was a well-known figure on the borders dance circuit. When I arrived at Edinburgh University I looked round the civil engineering class and thought not many women here - in fact there were none. As it happened at the freshers' fair I was encouraged to join New Scotland (Edinburgh University New Scotland Scottish Country dance Society... what a mouthful) so along I went and have never regretted it. In fact it was through Dunedin Dancers - the graduates of New Scotland - that I met my wife.

Where have I danced? I must admit this is the first year I have danced at Summer School. Thanks initially to New Scotland and latterly Dunedin I have usually been able to dance abroad at dance festivals as well as the biennial folk dance festival run by Dunedin in Edinburgh. I was very lucky to be able to be one of the founding members of Dunedin Dancers. I was fortunate in that after graduating I was able to join the Edinburgh Branch demonstration team as they started to be short of men - being a man was a great asset if you wanted to join a demonstration team. There were a lot of good demonstrations then, particularly the Civics and Government at the Castle. I had just been elected to the Branch committee when the company moved me to Newcastle. A lucky escape for the committee!

Chris and I experienced one of the lesser appreciated benefits of the Society when work commitments took us to Newcastle and Cockermouth where the friendship extended to us and the fun of dancing made the travels more enjoyable. Also during this period our daughter Kirsten and son Cameron were born – one in Newcastle the other in Whitehaven.

The family returned to Balerno but my own travels with work continued with spells of time in

Aberdeen, London and Cheltenham. Yet again friendships in dancing made the living away from home more bearable but I did miss a lot of my children growing up.

I must admit that I did enjoy my time when travelling weekly to work in London. I used to travel down overnight on the Sunday but still thought it worth while to make the effort to go to Pont Street for the regular dancing under John Laurie's watchful eye, not forgetting the pub afterwards. On the Tuesday there was the demonstration class with Bill Ireland. Interspersed with this was the Mary Stoker class where I was referred to as Rin Tin Man by Mary. Occasionally I had to work at the weekend and these I planned to coincide with a Saturday dance. I still remember the Porchester Hall dances with great affection. The friendships formed during these days are still there and were a particular help at my first visit to St Andrews this year.

Soon I changed companies and started to work more locally. This gave me the opportunity to re-join the Edinburgh Branch demonstration team which resulted in a memorable three week trip to Japan as well trips to Sweden and Holland. Thanks to New Scotland and Dunedin I have visited Peru, Denmark, Belgium, Germany, France, Poland, Slovenia and Italy.

The final reason for failing to attend Summer school, not forgetting family holidays, was the Edinburgh Fancy. Yes I know it will surprise you but I did dance at the Royal High School then at George Square Theatre. I was the chairman when the Fancy was stopped and re-invented as Strictly Scottish and then Spirit of Scotland and have danced in all of them. Latterly I have stopped demonstrating but was fortunate to be asked do the choreography for the latest show — Dancing Forth

The What can be split into two.

The first takes me back to St Andrews where I was asked what I wanted to achieve during my two years. My aim is to try to encourage more youngsters to join the society. I feel that due to the immense efforts of my predecessors the Society has been perhaps too successful. There is now a plentiful supply of dances and music so they feel they do not need to join. We must remember that the aim of the Society is to promote Scottish Country Dancing and maintain standards but we must also be welcoming to those who may not attain these standards but get as much enjoyment out of dancing.

The second is what experience do I have for the role? While at University I was New Scotland (President) and Convener of Student Charities Appeal. When Chairman of Edinburgh Branch I was also on the Executive Council with appearances on the GP and Finance committees. After a break when I was Chairman of Dunedin I returned to the Executive Committee as Tokyo representative and was elected to the Publications Committee before becoming Chairman Elect. So my life has been dominated by committee work – just like my parents and brother Hunte.

To finish I would like to say how very proud I am to have been elected as Chairman and I hope that I can build on the hard work and excellent management skills of Jean who has brought to fruition the vision started by Linda then Allan and not forgetting the support from all the hard working committees and the staff at 12 Coates Crescent.

THE SOCIETY AGM PERTH 2004

A number of London Branch members, including 15 as delegates, attended the 75th AGM of the Society in Perth on Saturday 6th November. After enjoying the Ball on the Friday night, attended by over 720 dancers, we settled down to the more serious business on the Saturday.

During the morning, Jimmie Hill gave an excellent presentation about the advantages of considering the formation of Teachers Associations where teachers could share ideas and help others with advice. This was followed by Alex Gray presenting the new examination structure about to be implemented, which will reflect a more professional approach. The teaching certificate is now separated into five distinct units.

The afternoon proceeded with the Annual General Meeting proper presided over by the Earl of Mansfield with 250 delegates and 200 observers present. A number of Scrolls were presented including Bobby Brown, the late Alice Murphy, Elma McCausland, Jennifer Wilson and the retiring treasurer, Marilyn Jeffcoats.

The formal part of the meeting included a motion proposing a slight reduction of 20% for the annual subscription to members who are under 25 and for the second or more family members living in the same household. The former was approved but unfortunately the latter was defeated by a large majority. Other points of interest affected the publication of Book 45 and the Bulletin. Both will appear in the present format for the last time.

The Bulletin will be replaced by a twice yearly members' magazine from next autumn and a more efficient way of publishing the dance books is being considered.

Jean Martin, as the retiring Chairman, in her speech of thanks, urged members of branches to consider encouraging younger members to serve on branch committees as a rejuvenation of the Society in general. She then stepped down to make way for the new chairman, Stewart Adam. Elaine Wilde of Croydon thanked those concerned for the organisation of the weekend and the meeting ended at 4.35 pm.

The meeting was followed by a more informal dance again, enjoyed by over 750 dancers.



One or two who had never attended a British dance before were feeling rather apprehensive at the idea of meeting dancers from such a well established branch (75 years is quite something). However they soon realised that the atmosphere was to be relaxed and the gathering would, indeed, be 'Cordiale'.

There was a very warm welcome and together the French and British were able to share their common enthusiasm in dancing to the music of Green Ginger, whom everybody was delighted to see and hear again.

Those who were put up by local dancers will always remember the kindness of their hosts. Let us take this opportunity to thank them once again. As in all journeys, the aspect of tourism cannot be ignored and it was an opportunity to discover the pretty suburbs and learn about their past as well as their present.

We took our leave, full of enthusiasm to prolong this 'Entente' and meet together again next year – on French soil.

'How much English will they speak?' I wondered – as well as being unsure how much French some of us could manage – when I was organising accommodation in Dulwich for our French guests attending the Entente Cordiale weekend. I needn't have worried: all the guests and hosts seem to have got on extremely well communicating in a mixture of both languages plus a sprinkling of sign language. We all found our guests charming and most appreciative and, as those present at the Saturday night dance at Pont Street will have noticed, they are beautiful dancers with a delightfully light-hearted manner.

The French dancers able to stay for the Sunday activities in Chiswick (plus those of their Dulwich hosts not swotting for Open University exams) greatly enjoyed Alastair Aitkenhead's teaching of 'The Lancers', a formidable memory test but very stimulating. We then faced a different sort of challenge trying to emulate Mylène Rousseau's nimble footwork as she taught us some intriguing Basque dances and some from Brittany. particularly challenging if you don't have Mylène's supple feet and ankles.

75TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION BALL

Hurlingham, 30th October 2004

We knew it was going to be special. A 75th anniversary ball – at the magnificent, newly reconstructed Hurlingham Club – Highland dress/black tie specified – and dancing to Ian Muir and the Craigellachie Band. An event, we reckoned, not to be missed.

Peter Knight and the committee had been planning for months ahead, and 295 tickets had sold like the hottest of hot cakes. Kilts had been cleaned and new frocks bought (some of us had trailed so long and hard round the London shops that we were in some doubt whether we would have the energy actually to dance).

The evening came, and the dancers were out in force: from London, naturally, and from all round the UK, from France and from Belgium. And we were all delighted to see London Branch President Mary Stoker as well as the RSCDS President, Jean Martin, and President-Elect Stewart Adam, with their respective partners.

Proceedings began with a champagne reception, and then a triumphant blast of music from the pipes and drums of the London Scottish Regiment. A quick warm-up by Craigellachie, and then Simon Wales was announcing the first dance and off we went. We might have worried whether Hurlingham could cope with the numbers, but no problem: 30-something sets fitted comfortably into the double hall, with the band planted neatly in the middle.

It was a perfectly balanced programme, though whoever chose Petronella should be reminded that it is a KILLER of a dance with all that setting. Once we had reminded ourselves which was Miss Milligan's and which was Miss Gibson's Strathspey; that the Last of the Lairds does indeed require everyone to cross over as they reach the top of the reel; and that Miss Mary Douglas goes fast, then slow, and then like the clappers: it all went brilliantly. It almost seemed a pity to have to stop for a meal.

But it was worth the stop. The round tables were beautifully decorated, with blue and white balloons and vases of tall blue and white flowers (hours of work by Gill Lumbas, Davinia Mila and Cherry West must have gone into achieving the effect). The meal was delicious.

And then the second half, MC'd by Andrew Kellett. By then Craigellachie, whose playing in the first half had been one of the great pleasures of the evening, were well into their stride and playing out of their skins. Whereas the conventional wisdom is that the band should face towards the dancers, it seemed as though Criagellachie's playing actually gained intensity from their enforced arrangement, facing each other.

At the end of the evening, the dancers joined hands all around the double hall, surrounding the band, for Auld Lang Syne. Dancers who had skip-stepped, slip-stepped, set and strathspeyed lightly through the evening began to notice their sore feet. But the enjoyment on all our faces was clear to see. We had known it would be special, and indeed it was.

MANAGEMENT BOARD REPORT

A lot of work has been put into the New Examination Structure; the Board congratulated the Education and Training Committee on the Structure and the wide ranging consultation which had taken place, and agreed unanimously to accept it with certain amendments.

The implementation will be gradual, beginning in March 2005.

The Committee are planning to hold an examiners' seminar during the second week of Summer School 2005. The session for training new examiners has taken place and three suitable overseas candidates as potential examiners have been identified by the selection panel.

It was reported that Winter School is fully subscribed with a waiting list.

The Manual is now in the final stages of its production and will be ready early in 2005. Mention was made of a new magazine, 'Dance On', launched by 'The Box and Fiddle'; the first issue will contain an article on the history of the RSCDS.

This was Jean Martin's last meeting as Society Chairman; in her concluding observations she made several points – the friendly atmosphere had led to good working relationship; initially there had possibly been too much emphasis on detail; the Board is for those who are interested in policy, and those who are interested in detail should be on committees; the number of people involved in the management of the Society's affairs was about right but the Management Board was still too big; more effort should be put into PR to develop the Society's image.

She expressed her appreciation of the hospitality received from Branches, thanked those whose period of office finishes in November for their contribution to the work of the Society and wished Stewart Adam every success as Chairman of the Society.

Two members whose period of office is completed are London Branch members Wilson Nicol and Andrew Kellett.

The next Board meeting, the first after the AGM, will be on Saturday 27th November 2005.

BRANCH DEVELOPMENT SELF-ASSESSMENT

The main aim of the Strategic Plan is to ensure that in all areas of its work the Society is thinking and planning ahead. With this in mind the Management Board felt it important to include Branches in this process and so put forward for consideration by Branches nine headings, with questions under each as a brief guide to help Branch members and committees focus their thinking in key areas so that Branches may play their part in achieving the Society's aims and objectives. The whole document can be seen on the Society website members' area, www.rscds.org.

The subcommittee convenors and the main committee have considered them, there was discussion at the AGM and the committee is pleased that in many of the areas mentioned the Branch is making its contribution.

Two areas that were mentioned at the AGM where development was needed were:

- 1. Publicity London has particular problems because of its size; The Reel and the website reach members; the website reaches those with access to the internet who are looking for information. It was felt at the AGM that the Branch needed to work in several directions - non dancers, dancers and generally raising the profile of the Branch in London. To do this we aim to allocate a advertising budget, develop the website, find ways of contacting local television/radio and sending out regular press releases effectively and appoint someone who will take responsibility for being the contact, ensure that appropriate publicity is available at every event the Branch is involved in, flyers are prepared in good time.
- 2. Youth while work is continuing encouraging children to dance at St. Columba's (see Children's Column page 4) there is a great need, from enquiries received, for children's classes in the suburbs, and the Branch must apply itself to arranging training for people who would be interested in teaching children to dance and locating members who might be willing to run classes in schools.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

SHORTAGE OF MALE DANCERS

ODERN ballrooms exhibit a feature which would not have been socially acceptable before 1914: the spectacle of two women dancing together. Even on the television screen one can see two women partnering each other in modern ballroom dances; a team of girls dancing a country dance designed for the two sexes, and, most extraordinary of all, three girls and a boy performing a Foursome Reel.

One reason for this inequality of the sexes has been the emancipation of women, who have become accustomed to fending for themselves, going places on their own, and, if they like dancing, not bothering about male partners. They say, "If we waited for men partners we should never dance." Country dancing lends itself admirably to an all-woman cast.

But there is another, more important, reason for the shortage of male dancers. When there is a boy and a girl in the family, the girl at the age of four attends a dancing class, and receives a good grounding in the art, while the boy does not learn dancing, probably because Father considers it effeminate.

DIRECTIVES

N a breezy yet emphatic speech to the S.C.D.S. Summer School at St. Andrews, Miss Milligan said:

"In the skip-change-of-step. The foot must *not* go under, but it *must* close."

"There must be no two-beat pas de basque . . . The jeté must not go out to the side or to the back"

"The travelling strathspey begins with a long slide, *not* a hop."

Our mentor led up to these remarks by saying she was perturbed by the things she had seen and heard in her peregrinations among the Branches. "There should be less quarrelsome or petulant discussion over slight variations or differences of style; the Society is now so big, all can't be of a pattern."

Although standards must be set—and the present basic technique was as it had existed for 150 to 200 years—no one was entitled to say whether a thing was right or wrong, except where it departed from the basic: one might only state one's preferences.

Miss Milligan began her speech with a serious exhortation, repeated later, that "the Society's first object is social." She also spoke of demonstrations, saying: "Scottish Country Dancers don't take money for demonstrations, they dance because they want to pass on to others the happiness and joy they themselves get from dancing."

DANCE POPULARITY

By what ingenious system the dances are selected for a programme is a mystery to me. Stranger still is the success of the system because one never hears grumbles or harsh comments, just an occasional bleat, "Oh! I don't know that one."

For the idle fun of finding out which dances are more popular than others, I went through 15 London Branch dance programmes beginning with 27th November 1948, and ending with 25 October, 1950. The Branch danced Duke of Perth and The Reel of the 51st Division eleven times. She's Ower Young and Lamb Skinnet, eight times. Next came Waltz Country Dance, The New Rigged Ship, Hamilton House, General Stuart's Reel, seven times. Then, six times we danced Scottish Reform, Strathglass House, Monymusk, Mrs Stewart's Strathspey and Meg Merrilees. It is a little surprising to find we danced Glasgow Highlanders only five times, equalling the lesser known Dalkeith's Strathspey and Ladies' Fancy.

Seven dances were danced four times, viz: La Tempête, The Black Dance, The Duran Ranger, Jessie's Hornpipe, The Machine Without horses, Miss Mary Douglas and Miss Murray of Ochtertyre.

Think of any Reel Club and the frequency of Petronella. It's a relief to know we only danced it three times, together with Miss Nancy Frowns, Greig's Pipes and Grant's Rant. Seventeen dances had two appearances and 27 dances only one.

Finally: to save you the trouble, the figures are—15 evenings with 212 dances, not including an eightsome and foursome on every programme.

S.C.D. SCHOOL IN ENGLAND

TO THE EDITORS OF THE REEL

Sirs,—Since the War, SUMMER SCHOOLS, mainly organised by the Universities and held at large boarding schools in the country, have become very popular with thousands of students from all walks of life and of all ages. The students spend delightful holidays, studying not only the subjects of their choice, but also taking part in other social activities, such as swimming, tennis, country walks, etc.

The R.S.C.D.S. Summer School at St. Andrews is always full, and preference is given to teachers. I feel that the number of students attending S.C.D. classes in England, is now large enough to justify the organisation of a summer school in a country setting in England. As the London branch is the largest branch in England, I suggest that its committee could well organise such a school, which would become an annual event. The Committee should get help and advice from headquarters, making it clear that this school would not be in opposition to St. Andrews, but a school where ordinary keen members could put in a fortnight's intensive work in ideal conditions to improve the standard of dancing. There are enough experienced teachers in London and the provinces to provide the staff for such a school.

If this suggestion appeals to members of the Society, I ask them to help the Committee, by writing to the Hon. Secretary of the London Branch, and let other dancers who do not normally see The Reel read this letter, and if possible enlist their support.

If the Committee is to organise the first R.S.C.D.S. Summer School in England, it will need encouragement and support, so keen members who want a Summer School, are urged to write now to the Hon. Secretary.

Dear Sir,

Some time ago I had a somewhat embarrassing experience during the performance of this lovely dance. I had obtained from the deviser of the dance, Mr. Cosh, a supply of copies of his booklet (which is sold in aid of the National Fund for Polio Research) and distributed them among members of a group with whom I have for over a year been practising Scottish country dances. When some of us joined in a dance at another centre we found ourselves colliding with other dancers who had apparently been instructed to pass, in the centre, by the right shoulder, contrary to the instructions in Mr. Cosh's book I was almost rudely told that I was doing the dance wrongly. I wrote at the time to Mr Cosh and his reply not only made it clear that he had definitely intended the dancing couple to pass in the centre by the Left shoulder (as this is, he pointed out, the correct procedure for reels of four) but had emphasised the instruction by having it printed in italics in the booklet.

The RSCDS in the 21st Century

Acton, London

Dear Daniel,

I am writing in response to the letter from Mary Stoker (The Reel No.249). Reflection is made on the numbers attending dances 40 years ago and the numbers attending to-day and wondering about the decline in attendance. It is quite obvious that there are many more diversions now than years ago. Half the population either has a computer or has access to one with all the Internet aspects, plus of course VHS/DVDs, longer club hours, a myriad of specialist societies/associations, etc, etc. The call on peoples' time is so great these days, not only with many recreational facilities available but with a greater pressure in the workplace. Sadly, it is a fact that people spend longer in the workplace than they did years ago. Therefore, with free time being so important, to pledge oneself to a dance, weeks in advance, takes some commitment. I do not believe it is possible to compete with all these other diversions - the RSCDS will just have to accept that numbers attending will never return to those of yesteryear.

In addition, young people on the whole want something a great deal more lively than the usual RSCDS Scottish dance, where in my experience the average age appears to be well-advanced and certainly above the average age at other forms of dance I attend, i.e. Ballroom, Line and Salsa. Perhaps like Radio 4 listeners, it is something you come to at certain age? With the demographic trend being that in 20 years time there will be more over 65 year olds than under 16 year olds, maybe in the future some will be attracted to Scottish dancing.

I do feel that the RSCDS does not reach out sufficiently to a wider audience. If an appeal that Scottish dancing is a great social activity, being not only a way of meeting people but also a good form of exercise, this may entice newcomers. Attending National Dance exhibitions together with publicity generated at shows where the Demonstration Team perform, are all to be applauded; plus classes at London-wide Evening Institutes could also assist membership (although I recognise there are only a limited number of teachers around).

However, the sad truth is, that when the current RSCDS dancers start to take off their dancing pumps membership numbers will fall off dramatically as there are too few of the future generation to take their place. At the moment some at Pont Street present a disapproving face to newcomers. It may not be until a crisis point is reached in membership numbers that a more welcoming stance is taken up; hopefully it won't be too late by then!

The naked truth

Dear Daniel,

Stephen Webb's amusing account (issue 249) of his encounter with cheeky Japanese tourists set me wondering again why some dancers submit themselves to discomfort and possible embarrassment.

Eighteenth-century Highlanders wore nothing under their kilts for practical reasons. The Highland regiments naturally continued this practice and, as the military do, erected it into a matter of pride and compulsion. Hence the nonsense of NCOs with mirrors on sticks, and prohibitions against mounting the top decks of buses, or bending to pick anything up. After the 'forty-five', Highland dress was forbidden in Scotland except to the regiments. A generation later, when the prohibition was lifted, the gentry (who were the only Highlanders to resume the dress), had to consult the regiments as the only source for how it was worn. Most of the details which are now held up as 'correct' are clearly derived from nineteenth-century military uniform. Personally I wear the kilt as modern civilian dress: neither uniform nor fancy dress.

Those dancers who do feel bound to adhere to the regimental dress codes might consider that those codes insist on underpants for sports and dancing.

Probably, because this practice of booking partners way ahead is becoming all too common and can easily snowball out of control as others feel obliged to join in, just to have a chance of a dance with one or two favourite partners.

To my mind, the practice is not only contrary to the social nature of Scottish country dancing, but is also impolite to our visitors and inconsiderate to the inexperienced who often welcome an invitation to dance as the evening progresses. Of course, there will be times when you want to ask someone for a particular dance but, in general, is there any reason to book a partner for more than the next couple of dances?

Can anything be done about it? Probably not. There will always be the inveterate 'bookers' who prowl the floor, inviting the select few to dance with him or her throughout the evening but, at the very least, it should be seen as perfectly normal to decline such offers without causing any offence.

AT LAST! GERMANY'S FIRST BRANCH

London Branch Member, Jim Cook, is pleased to report on the formation of the very first RSCDS Branch in Germany

I have danced in many parts of Germany in recent years and, bearing in mind the large number of clubs and the great ability and enthusiasm for Scottish Country Dancing which I have encountered there, I was amazed that no RSCDS branch existed anywhere in the country, that is up until now. Easter 2004 saw the formation of the Central Germany Branch. Why the delay?

I have found that many groups in Germany run evening classes under the Volkshochschule (VHS) adult education class system where courses in many subjects are offered to the public, Scottish Country Dancing being one of them. Coming under this umbrella, inbuilt publicity through the VHS system is assured and financial grants are available. However, if any such SCD group tried to establish itself as a Branch of the RSCDS, a society whose HQ is in another country, German law would cause the financial benefits to be forfeited.

Within Germany, there is clearly an affinity to the RSCDS. You only have to go to the St. Andrews Summer School to meet the many German members of the RSCDS, albeit they have probably been HQ members up to now. When I dance in Germany, at classes or balls, I see dancers striving to adhere to RSCDS standards. Now the Central Germany Branch provides an RSCDS focus within the country but allows local groups to continue functioning exactly as they do now.

Some classes I have visited have fully, or preliminary, qualified RSCDS teachers at the helm. Elsewhere, the teachers are unqualified, they being local dancers with an aptitude who do their best in this role because, simply, there is nobody else. The Central Germany Branch will make it easier for them to have access to teacher training courses. As I see it, even courses not necessarily leading to a formal qualification will be of benefit to unqualified teachers. They may never have experienced any sort of teaching course, but they are so important to the survival of small groups in far off corners of Germany. In short, the Branch is best placed to cater for Germany's special needs. Carola Fischer (Chairman) and Martina Müller-Franz (Secretary) pick up the story:

"Much discussion has taken place over the years and much preparation was necessary to ensure that the Branch would be legally acceptable under German Law. The Kuckucksnest (described in issue 235 of *The Reel*), with its in-house facilities and dance studio, has become a natural meeting place for Scottish Dancers. Its regular SCD courses and workshops, to a high standard of teaching, attract over 200 dancers each year from Germany and other countries. As it is geographically central, being 50 miles north east of Frankfurt (Main) in Schlüchtern-Vollmerz, it was decided this should be the Branch's base.

"The first Branch meeting took place at the annual Easter course, attended by dancers and teachers from all over Germany. Before classes started on Easter Saturday, the eight founding members obtained the official seal at the local registration office, after which glasses were raised. The celebrations continued with coffee and "Branch cake" before the afternoon classes commenced.

"The Branch is a tangible sign of dancers' enthusiasm and the effort involved in supporting the aims and standards of the RSCDS. Membership is now cheaper and easier to come

by. There is now official representation for Germany, and, as Jim says, the possibility of assistance in training SCD teachers.

"The Branch will organise events of its own. Indeed the first will be a workshop for teachers, whether already RSCDS qualified or not, and for potential teachers who may possibly be preparing for the teaching exams. This will be taught by Brenda Burnell at the Kuckucksnest 21-24 April 2005. Contact Martina (see below) for details. Also the Branch has asked Jim to co-organise, with Carola, our first birthday celebrations. Over to Jim."

Yes, the Branch invites dancers worldwide to join its members in a celebratory week of "Dancing and Culture" at the Kuckucksnest, 22-28 August 2005. This builds on the great success of the London Branch's "Reel Goes Cuckoo" week in 2002 (see issue 242 of The Reel) at which Reel readers from many countries enjoyed the dancing classes and socials, and also the organised walks and excursions to local places of interest in this historic and beautiful part of the country. Our teacher will be Anne Smyth from Fort William and the music will be supplied by Ken Martlew and Barbara Manning. If you missed out in 2002, do not ignore 2005. I have full details.




